

### MEDFORD COMPANY ENTERS FIELD OF COLOR PRINTING

The Medford Printing company has just completed a job of 15,000 four-page circulars in five colors for the Rogue River Fruit & Produce association, which has been received with great delight wherever shown.

The object of the circulars, which have been mailed throughout the east, is to bring to the attention of the apple-buying public the merits of the apples from this valley, particularly the Newtown variety. Mailing lists were secured and these circulars were sent in sealed envelopes with 2-cent stamps to their destination. It is thought this plan will increase the sales and popularity of the Rogue river apples and other fruit several thousand boxes annually, the increase being cumulative.

If the plans work out as conceived the idea will be enlarged from season to season until the deliciousness of our fruits is known in every household in the east.

### MEDFORD TO PLAY FOR CHAMPIONSHIP ASHLAND SATURDAY

Ashland and Medford will meet in the former city Saturday afternoon in a struggle for the football championship of Southern Oregon. Both teams have gone through the season without a single defeat and the game promises to be a battle royal.

Medford rooters 500 strong will accompany the team to Ashland, where they will occupy one entire side of the bleachers. Accompanying the team will be a 30-piece band, which will furnish the accompaniment for several new and peppy high school songs.

Ashland will be represented by a large delegation of rooters organized under the leadership of Leith Abbott. Abbott is working on a number of new stunts to be pulled between halves. Yell Leader Williamson of Medford is also counted on to spring some surprises in the way of rooting stunts.

By comparison of scores Medford seems to have all the beat of the done. Ashland barely defeated Klamath Falls, while the Medford-Klamath game was a walkaway for the home team. Ashland defeated Grants Pass 6-9, while Medford trounced them 26-9.

Medford's men will all be in the game, those who were injured in the Klamath and Grants Pass games having recovered. Coach Klum is putting his squad through strenuous work in an effort to round the men into condition. Lack of condition, if anything, will be responsible for a victory by Ashland. The local squad seemingly will not observe training rules religiously and breaking training may spell defeat.

Some anxiety has been expressed over the condition of Wilkins, the Grants Pass player, who was hurt in the election day game. A letter dated November 9, was received from H. H. Wardrit, principal of the Grants Pass high school, an extract from which is as follows:

"I must congratulate you upon the game your boys played election day. Our man, Wilkins, is still out of his head. His condition is not due to injuries received in the game. He suffered a sunstroke four years ago, and had the same trouble a number of times since, although he knew nothing of it."

### R. R. ASSOCIATION CONSIDERS RELIEF OF CAR SHORTAGE

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—The American Railway association at its semi-annual meeting here today to consider the car shortage situation, adopted a per diem charge ranging from 45 cents to \$1.25 for each freight car which any one road shall withhold from another, and decided to impose a demurrage penalty on any road which violates the association rules relating to car shortage.

The association also appointed a committee which will confer in Louisville Friday with Interstate Com-

merce Commissioner M-Chord with a view to effecting co-operation with the government in the car shortage situation.

The association announced that it was neutral in regard to the daylight saving plan which also was before it for consideration.

It is the plan of the railroads to make the demurrage rules effective December 1, assuming the approval of the interstate commerce commission.

The new rule is declared by the association to provide essentially drastic penalties against railroads detaining on their line freight cars belonging to another railroad. Following are the demurrage penalties proposed, which the association hopes will prompt the prompt unloading of freight cars by shippers.

After expiration of free time, \$2 for the first day, \$3 for the second day, \$4 for the third day, and \$5 for the fourth and each succeeding day.

### MINIMUM PRICE GOVERNMENT COAL LAND IS FIXED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—A declaration which may save the United States government several hundred million dollars was given here today by the district appeals court, holding that an act of congress requiring sale of government-owned coal lands in Montana and other states at from \$10 to \$20 an acre, fixed a minimum and not a maximum price. The appraised value of the lands is said to be nearly \$500,000,000 above the minimum prices. The suit came up in man-

damus proceedings by Fred W. Handley and Mae Handel of Montana to compel the secretary of the interior to accept the minimum price, when he had fixed \$70 per acre for these lands and declined to issue a patent until that price was paid. A lower court decision upholding the secretary was affirmed by the appeals court.

### WISCONSIN SOLDIER? VOTE FOR WILSON

MADISON, Wis., Nov. 15.—Unofficial figures indicate that President Wilson has won the Wisconsin soldiers' vote by only one ballot. The unofficial figures give Wilson, 973; Hughes, 972. Governor Philipp was given a two to one majority over

Burt Williams, his democratic opponent, the figures being as follows: Philipp, 1,561; Williams, 667.
