BREAKS OF LUCK DECIDE SATURDAYS GAME, ASHLAND

"The team that gets the breaks of luck will win," said Otto Klein, coach of the Medford high school team this morning, commenting on the game to be played with Ashland Saturday, which will decide the championship of Southern Oregon. "Luck will be the big factor in as much as the teams are very evenly matched. Ashland has an immense advantage in playing on their home ground. The field is slanting and handling the ball on the uneven ground will prove a puzzle to the Medford boys." The officials have been selected for the game. McClung, assistant coach at O. A. C., who came north with Coach Pipal of that school, will be referee. Sibley Hall will be umpire and Dr. Lance Briscoe will act as head linesman. Medford's backfield will be rearranged for the game with one new surprise in the makeup of the team to be sprung.
