VINING TO LECTURE ON BIG BROTHER TO LOCAL ELKS

An address on the big brother movement, as fostered all over the country by the Elks lodge, will be delivered Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock at the local Elks temple by Professor Irving Vining of Ashland.
