

MEDFORD WINS FROM ASHLAND BY SCORE OF 7-0

Medford captured the high school football championship of southern Oregon Saturday when the local team defeated the Ashland aggregation 7 to 0 on the latter's grounds. Medford's victory was due to breaks of luck coming her way, Ashland having the better team, as they made at least a third more yardage than the Medford squad.

Play was started with a snap the first quarter, both teams playing fast ball, with Ashland having a little advantage. In the second quarter Ashland was forced to punt on her own thirty-yard line. Normile broke through the Ashland line and blocked the punt. Fields scooped up the ball and raced for the goal, crossing it just as the gun was fired marking the end of the half. Brandon kicked goal, making the score 7-0.

In the second half Ashland was able to plow through the Medford line almost at will, but luck, however, preventing her from scoring. In the third quarter Lowe of Ashland carried the ball over the goal, only to fumble and lose the ball after having crossed the line.

In the fourth quarter Medford stiffened both in offense and defense, time being called when Medford held the ball on Ashland's three-foot line. Both teams tried for several field goals and failed.

Gentry and Corum were the stars for Medford, while Lowe shone for Ashland.

Fields, who carried the ball over for the touchdown, was also responsible for the winning of the Ashland game a year ago. During the year he was not put into action until the Ashland game. His good condition then enabled him to break through the Ashland line, carrying the ball over for the winning touchdown.

A large delegation of fans accompanied the team, both from the high school and city. All joined in a snake dance between halves. Following the Medford parade Ashland serpentine around the field, the leaders carrying a huge axe, which they promised to give Medford "in the neck."

The return game will be played on the local grounds Thanksgiving day, with the largest crowd of football fans of the year in attendance. Ashland will send practically all of the high school pupils, in addition to a large number of fans from the city.

The game scheduled with Franklin High of Portland has been cancelled, making the turkey day battle the last of the season.

SPECIAL ELECTION FOR IRRIGATION DISTRICT DEC. 27

The County Court this morning ordered a special election to be held December 27 for the creation of an irrigation district.

The land to come under the proposed district includes about 25,000 acres lying between Medford, Phoenix and Jacksonville and touching the corporate limits of these towns. Also there is a strip lying to the east of Medford and Phoenix, extending to the Hillcrest Orchard and another small strip north of Jacksonville, bounded by the Hopkins canal.

All citizens of Oregon owning land in the district, whether or not they reside on the land, may vote in the election. Citizens of Medford, Phoenix and Jacksonville will not vote unless they own land in the rural district, which will be subject to irrigation.

The election was called after a hearing held at Jacksonville before the County Court Friday and Saturday of last week, the popular demand for the election appearing great enough at the hearing to justify the calling of the election.

County Commissioner Madden last week went on record, declaring that he would refrain from voting upon submission of the district to a vote, because he was a property owner and tax payer in the district affected and because his business associate and partner, H. B. Hamley, was the principal objector, though he himself, was a believer in irrigation.

GREENBACK MINE ON GRAVES CREEK TO BE OPERATED

The famous Greenback mine, a gold-producing property that has added two and one-half millions of dollars to the wealth of the country, but which for the past eight years has been lying idle, is again to take its proper place in the industrial development of the district, says the Grants Pass Courier. It has lately passed into the hands of a company of people from Buffalo, N. Y., and the work of placing it in shape for operation is now in progress. Messrs. W. L. Baker and H. L. Holmes of Buffalo are here representing the new owners of the Greenback, and expect to have the stamps falling within a very short time.

The Greenback mine is a free-milling property located on Graves creek, twenty-two miles from Grants Pass, and about two miles north of Placer. It is equipped with a forty-stamp mill and with other machinery and buildings in proportion. It was operated upon a most extensive scale for about eight years, and was one of the best known and most valuable producers of the coast country. There are about three miles of underground workings in the property, and it is equipped with steam, water and electric power.

The discovery of the Greenback by prospectors was followed by its sale to eastern people for \$60,000, though the original discoverers took considerable gold from it right from the surface. It is a mine that developed itself, and beside paying for its magnificent equipment as it went, paid heavy dividends during the period of its operation. Difficulties arising in its operation eight years ago caused its being shut down, since which time it has been idle.

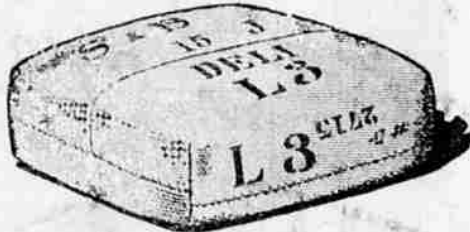

ILLINOIS VALLEY YOUTH KILLED BY AUTOMOBILE

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 20.—Clarence Hill, a young man, 23 years of age, was struck by an automobile late Friday afternoon near his home in the Illinois valley, and so badly injured that he died at an early hour Saturday morning. The automobile was a Buick belonging to J. Smith, of the Del Norte Claimholders association, and was driven by A. C. Hoffman, of Grants Pass. In the car with Mr. Hoffman were his wife and A. C. Hooper.

At a coroner's inquest, held Saturday afternoon at Kerby, a jury returned a verdict exonerating the driver of the car from blame, holding that Hill came to his death through his own negligence in stepping in front of the machine.
