COPPER MINES EVADING PAYMENT OF ROYALTIES DUE

BUTTE, Mont., Nov. 21.—The Butte and Superior Mining company is today resisting in federal court a motion to increase the bond under which it is operating the oil flotation process of reducing the ores, to the amount of a possible judgment covering royalties resulting from the use of the patent. A suit against the company by the Minerals Separation company, limited, of London is now pending in the supreme court of the United States in which royalties are demanded as the result of the use by the company of the flotation process of treating refractory ores.

Allegations made in support of the application for an increase in the bond are that with the use of this reduction process the company has netted more than \$15,000,000 according to its monthly statements filed with the federal court. It is charged that the Butte and Superior company has been disposing of its enormous assets and war profits in "excessive dividend disbursements to stockholders and in negotiating sale or merger of its properties to the American Zinc company in order to defeat a possible judgment, which may be rendered against it for infringement of patent."

The Butte and Superior company now has given bond in the sum of \$75,000 to protect the interests of the Minerals Separation company, but attorneys for that concern allege that should they secure judgment for infringement of patent, their claim would amount to a very much larger sum.

AUSTRIAN MONARCH IN ILL HEALTH

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 21.—A Vienna dispatch quotes the following bulletin issued respecting the health of Emperor Francis Joseph: "Last night a restricted inflammatory area appeared in the right lung, otherwise the extrapulmonary symptoms unaltered. The temperature this morning 38, evening 37.8 (feverish), heart's action good, breathing regular and quiet, appetite smaller."

PHONE GIRLS COMPLAIN OF COMPANY COERCION

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—Paul Herriott, chairman of the state social insurance commission, announced today that three telephone girls employed by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company had informed the board that they had been threatened with the loss of their positions if they testified. L. S. Hamm, traffic chief of the company, denied that any threats had been used in keeping girls employed by the company from testifying. He said the company would assist the commissioners in their efforts to ascertain actual working conditions among the telephone girls.

SUBMARINE SINKS NORWEGIAN STEAMER

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The master and part of the crew of the Norwegian steamer Finn landed today and reported that their vessel had been sunk by a German submarine. The steamship Director landed eight members of the crew of the Greek steamer Maria N. Rousson, which capsized. The other members of the crew were drowned.

There are two Norwegian steamships Finn, one of 3800 tons gross, the other of 230. The Marie N. Rousson, 3092 gross tons, was built in West Hartlepool in 1907 and was owned at Syria.

TICKET SYSTEM FOR FOOD IN NORWAY

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The royal provision committee of Norway has unanimously decided that a ticket system ought to be instituted to meet the food situation according to a Copenhagen dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company quoting the Norwegian food minister. At a meeting in Christiania the minister said that a great question had arisen as to whether the population of Norway should be put on a short food allowance.

GOVERNMENT ASKS 8 HOUR DECISION

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 21.—Frank Hangerman, acting as special counsel for the federal government, today filed in the federal district court before Judge William C. Hook a petition asking an immediate decision on the injunction against the Missouri eight-hour law by the Missouri-Okla. & Gulf railroad. The petition also asks for an order from Judge Hook directing the coaches of this road to join with the government in getting the case advanced before the supreme court, which convenes December 4.

The purpose of the suit, it was said, was to get a decision on the constitutionality of the Missouri law by the United States supreme court before January 1, when the law becomes effective.

CAN STAY IN JAIL UNTIL HE ROTS

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 21.—"He will stay in jail until my term expires, January 1, and if my successor will do me a favor, he will be in jail until he rots," was the answer State Circuit Judge Henry McGinn made here today to a petition for writ of habeas corpus from Edward Ralston, Portland, arrested for contempt of court, when it was charged he called the judge a "liar" recently. "He is insolent and contemptuous and is going to be handled with a baseball bat," McGinn added. Ralston was in court for not paying his divorced wife alimony when he was ordered to jail.
