tend the mains that the mill might have water for boilers and pond, and for fire protection, was presented to the city council last Tuesday night, and after reading was referred to the water committee for consideration. No action has as yet been taken by this committee.

The concrete footings for the mill were completed Friday, and if the weather is clear the work of putting up the mill frame will be begun Monday. The pond for the mill is half completed.

The mill machinery is expected to arrive in Medford the middle of next week.

A considerable number of subscribers to stock in the new mill have paid in the amounts of their subscriptions, but more money will be needed next week to pay the men who will be engaged in construction work and in paying freight on the mill machinery. Officers of the company are asking that all subscriptions be paid in as rapidly as possible.
