## STRAHORN TO BEGIN BUILDING RAILROAD

PORTLAND, Nov. 25.—Actual work on the construction of the proposed Oregon, California & Eastern railway will begin immediately upon the final outworkings of certain legal formalities at Klamath Falls and Lakeview. With everything working without hitch, this is possible of solution within thirty days.

Robert E. Strahorn, president of the railroad, made this announcement today on his return from Klamath Falls, where he participated in the campaign leading to the special election on the bond issue.

"The communities along the line of the proposed railway have lived up to the promises they made me during my midsummer trip," explained Mr. Strahorn. All have come through with everything they pledged, and in Lakeview and Klamath Falls especially they were practically unanimous, which speaks well for an early and favorable outcome.

## CARPENTERS OFF TO HUNT BIG GAME

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25.—Mr. and Mrs. George B. Carpenter of Medford, Or., left San Francisco yesterday for New York on the first lap of their trip to West Africa, where they will hunt big game.

Carpenter is a land owner and orchardist of Medford. In the summer Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter remain in Oregon, but they generally pass the winters hunting in one of the earth's most inaccessible and wildest spots.
