STATE OF OREGON, COUNTY OF JACKSON, ss: We, the undersigned, county clerk of Jackson County, do hereby certify that the above is a true, fair and complete estimate of the probable expenses of said county for the ensuing year and probable receipts from sources other than direct taxation upon real and personal property in its jurisdiction during the ensuing year. We further certify that the estimate of expenses of the various institutions of the county, of the amount required for public enterprises, roads, bridges, etc., and of all other expenses of the county as therein set out, is just and is based upon a careful study of the expenses of the county during the past and a thorough examination of its probable needs during the year for which such estimate is made. That each and every item therein is believed to be necessary for the proper transaction of the business of the county, the protecting of its property and interests and to be for the public welfare. That every expense estimated is in accordance with law, and is a legitimate charge against the county. Dated at Jacksonville, Oregon, November 10th, 1916. F. L. TOU VELLE, WM. C. LEEVER, F. H. Ordinance No. 855. An ordinance to regulate the use of the streets of the City of Medford and passage thereover by Automobiles, Motor Vehicles, Motorcycles, Bicycles, and other Vehicles and Motor Vehicles; and to regulate the speed thereof upon said streets. And to repeal all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith. The City of Medford doth ordain as follows: Section 1. All that portion of the City of Medford lying between the west line of Holly street on the west, Bear Creek on the east and north line of sixth street on the north and the south line of eighth street on the south, is hereby declared to be and constituted to be the business portion of the City of Medford for the purpose of this ordinance. Section 2. Every person is hereby forbidden to drive or cause to be driven any automobile or other motor vehicle on any street in the City of Medford at a greater rate of speed than sixteen (16) miles per hour; provided, however, the motor vehicles passing a public school on school days between the hours of 8 a. m. and 4 p. m., shall not exceed 10 miles per hour. Section 3. No person shall drive or cause any automobile or other motor vehicle, within the business portion of said city, to be driven to and stop along the side or curb of any street within said business portion of said city, unless the right side of said automobile or motor vehicle be next to said curb or side of such street. Section 4. Every vehicle whether motor or other vehicle, motorcycle, and bicycle, during the period from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise, shall display white lights in lamps on the front and one red light in the rear of such vehicle. The lights of the front lamps shall be visible at least 200 feet in the direction in which the vehicle is proceeding provided that motorcycles, bicycles and all vehicles other than motor cars shall be required to display but one light lamp to be placed on the front of the vehicle so that it shall be visible one hundred feet in the direction in which the vehicle is proceeding, and show a red light to the rear. Section 5. A vehicle headlight shall be so placed that it will not blind, dazzle or confuse other users of the streets, or make it difficult or unsafe for them to ride, drive or walk thereon. Section 6. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail for a period not exceeding fifty days. Section 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed. The foregoing ordinance was passed by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon, on the 21st day of November, 1916, by the following vote: Mann, aye; Emmens, aye; Amy, aye; Keene, no; Hargrave, aye; Davis, aye. 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JACKSON COUNTY BUDGET

NOTICE. Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 234, General Laws of Oregon, 1915, notice is hereby given that the County Court of Jackson County, Oregon, will meet in the Circuit Court room of the Court House in the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, on Thursday, the 7th day of December, 1916, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m. of said day, and at the said time and place opportunity will be given for a full and complete discussion of the estimate of the amount of money proposed to be raised by taxation for the ensuing year, as published herewith, by any taxpayer subject to such tax levy when made, in favor of or against any of the proposed tax levies herein as the County Court may deem for the best interests of Jackson County.

The County Court has prepared and submits the following: An estimate of the amount required for each department of county government, county office or county officer, each county improvement, the maintenance of each county building, structure or institution, the salary of each county officer or employe, including those whose salaries are fixed by statute, for the improvement and maintenance of public highways, roads, bridges, the construction, operation and maintenance of each public utility and redemption of outstanding warrants; an estimate of the probable receipts of the county from sources other than direct taxation upon the real and personal property in the county during the period for which such tax is to be levied, and the amount of balances on hand in the funds of the county at the time the levy will be made.
