

CHORAL SOCIETY SCORES TRIUMPH SECOND CONCERT

The most delightful concert ever rendered in Medford is the popular verdict of the second concert given by the Medford Choral Society, at the Page theatre Tuesday evening.

Without question, George Andrews ranks as the premier organizer and director in Oregon's musical circles and with the talent at his command, there is no reason why Medford should not become famous by producing musical festivals that will attract people from all portions of the state.

PUBLIC REFUSING TO BUY TURKEYS SENDS PRICE DOWN

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 29.—With the public refusing to buy turkeys at high prices, the market here suffered another sharp slump today. Prices this morning were as low as 18 cents a pound. Further price reductions are expected.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—The price of cold storage eggs at wholesale was 1 to 2 cents lower than yesterday morning, when the egg boycott began. Eggs sold at 34 to 38 cents a dozen, according to grade. The average price for fresh eggs was 63 cents, as compared with 55 cents at this time a year ago. The price of fresh eggs showed no change from yesterday.

Some wholesale dealers asserted that the boycott would play into the hands of the foreign buyers. They said that men who want eggs for export are waiting for a price reduction.

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—City, state and federal officials, together with civic, women and other organizations, were working today to solve the high cost of foodstuffs problem.

It was announced that municipal inspectors had discovered in storage about 800,000 eggs of questionable quality, while more than 2,000,000 eggs were found in cold storage houses awaiting price increases. In addition government inspectors found 30,000,000 eggs stored in another warehouse.

Charles F. Clynne, United States district attorney, began an inquiry into charges that James E. Wetz is the holder of 72,000,000 eggs in Chicago and to learn who is backing the alleged attempted corner.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29.—Turkeys dropped to thirty cents a pound in retail markets here today because dealers said, too many consumers refused to pay 35 cents, the price which has prevailed all week. There are so many Thanksgiving birds on hand here it was said, many will be kept in cold storage until Christmas.

Forty I. W. W.'s passed through Eugene Tuesday evening, but made no motion to detain. They will arrive in Medford tonight, but in all probability will continue to Ashland before alighting.

AUSTRIA REQUESTS RED CROSS STOP WORK IN SERBIA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Austria-Hungary has asked the American Red Cross to discontinue relief work in Belgrade and in other parts of northern Serbia conquered by the Teutonic forces, when supplies now on hand have been distributed. The suggestion reached here today through Ambassador Penfield at Vienna. The Austrian government expressed its deepest gratitude to the Red Cross for what has been done and gave no reason for asking for its discontinuance.

Red Cross officials here, surprised at the request, say the work practically is at a standstill because of the impossibility of securing supplies since Rumania entered the war. The work will necessarily cease about December 1.

Nearly 475,000 have been contributed to that section from this country, while 100 carloads of supplies from Rumanian relief committees and 80 from Swiss committees, assisted by Charles Fox, has cared for about 36,000 people in Belgrade, and Dr. Raymond Ryan has endeavored to reach about 100,000 in the interior.

American relief in southern Serbia now is thrown in greater importance by Austria's request and especially by the advance of the allied armies about Monastir. Reports from that city say 200,000 people are in distress, as the retreating armies of the central powers are said to have stripped the city bare of food and supplies. Shipments are being prepared for that section.

Rumans Endangered.

The rapid progress made by General Von Falkenhayn's armies moving east in Rumania of course has been largely made possible by the operation of the Danube forces under Field Marshal Von Mackensen. Flanked out of the Alt valley position by the crossing of the river at Zimniza, the Rumanian line along the Veda running diagonally northwest from the Danube, likewise is imperiled by the Teutonic occupation of Giurgiu, an advance from which would quickly compel a Rumanian retreat.

It still remains to be developed whether the process of flanking the Rumanians out of their positions is to be continued by other crossings of the Danube still further east. The southern bank of the river is held by the central powers to a point beyond Tchernavoda.

That the retreat of the Rumanians toward the nearer defenses of Bucharest is already under way and is

FRANCE TAXES PROFITS OF LARGER STORES

PARIS, Nov. 29.—The senate, which is debating the income tax bill, has adopted a clause taxing the profits of large stores of which the annual turnover exceeds 2,000,000 francs. The tax is 1 per cent on profits or turnovers from 2,000,000 to 5,000,000; 2 per cent up to 50,000,000; 3 from 50,000,000 to 100,000,000; 4 from 100,000,000 to 200,000,000; 5 above 200,000,000.

An amendment proposing an all-round tax of 2 per cent was rejected. Minister of Finance Ribot said that this would be hard on some of the big stores.

RUSSIAN TRANSPORTS REPORTED SUNK

BERLIN, Nov. 29.—Two large Russian transports, bound from Helsingfors for Revel, were sunk in the latter part of October as the result, it is believed, of striking a mine, says a dispatch from Stockholm to the Overseas News agency. The transports, it is said, had the entire 428th Russian regiment on board. This regiment, it is said, had been on duty for some time in Finland.


