

MEDFORD WINS FROM ASHLAND BY SCORE 10 TO 0

"Hallelujah! Broke Again" was the song of the Ashland rooters as they fled away from the ball park Thanksgiving afternoon after watching Medford trim Ashland to the tune of 10 to 0. The game was closely contested, more closely than the score would indicate and the general impression was "The best high school game I ever saw." Over 1,500 people witnessed the game.

In the first quarter Medford kept the ball close to the Ashland goal, at one time having a good chance for a touchdown, which was killed by the failure of a fake shift play on the Ashland twenty-yard line, on the fourth down with two yards to go. With the ball in Ashland's hands, it was carried down to midfield when the quarter ended.

Field Goal Kicked. Ashland came within striking distance of the Medford goal in the second quarter, but Medford held and Ashland lost the ball on downs. After an exchange of punts Medford carried the ball to Ashland's twenty-yard line where Brandon kicked a field goal. Score at the end of first half, Medford 3; Ashland 0.

The third quarter was even, both teams showing plenty of pep and ability to get through, yet at critical moments, each side held and prevented scoring. In this quarter several forward passes were tried, Ashland completing two for substantial gains and Medford completing one, which, however, netted but a small gain.

The winning score came in the fourth quarter, when Medford made a fair catch of an Ashland forward pass and carried the ball to the twenty-yard line. Straight line bucks by Calhoun, Gentry and Corum carried the ball within a few feet of the Ashland goal. Ashland held for two downs when Calhoun carried the ball through Ashland's left tackle for a touchdown. Brandon kicked goal. Final score 10-0.

Game Fast Throughout. Play throughout the game was fast, the field being firm and dry. Ashland used two men as defensive centers, a new style of play worked out by Coach Heidenreich. However, Medford's gains were made through tackle and guard so that the centers were not effective. A feature of the game was the few end runs made, only two being attempted.

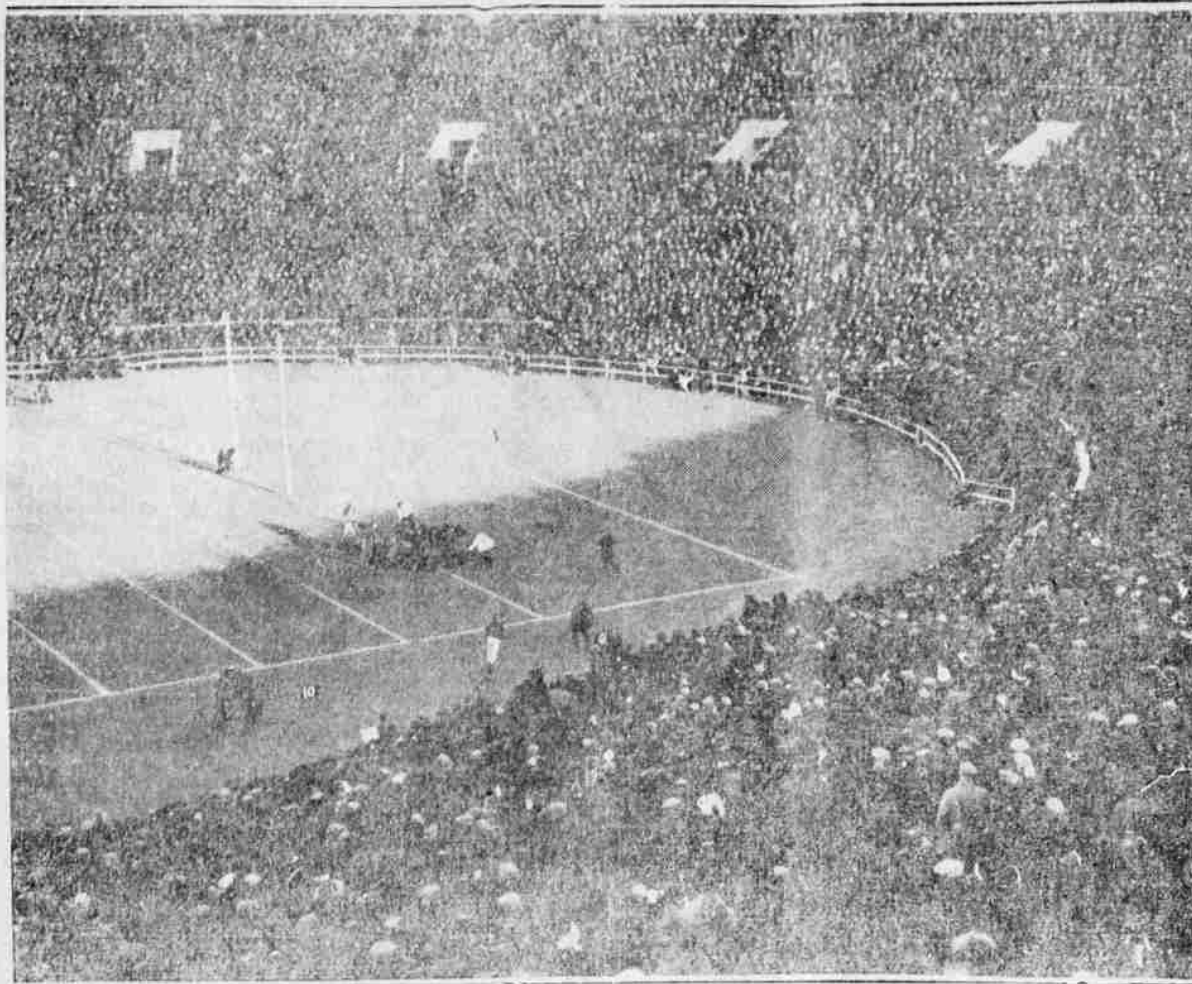
A large delegation of rooters from both the Ashland and Medford schools were on hand and under the direction of Cheer Leader Abbott of Ashland and Williamson of Medford, made a good showing. A feature of the rooting was the work of the high school bands. Ashland's musical organization, presumably freshmen, as yesterday was their first appearance, were attired in natty red coats, which set off well their dusky complexions.

Calhoun, Gentry and Corum were the stars for Medford. Fields played a good game at times, but showed a lack of condition due to persistent breaking of training rules. Brandon ran the team handily and showed up especially well in kicking, taking his time and placing his punts to the best advantage. His punting averaged well over ten yards more than his opponent.

Lowe was the individual star for Ashland, the whole team backing him up well.

The high school alumni will stage a celebration over the winning of the Southern Oregon football championship, at the armory Saturday, December 2. The occasion will be the alumni Thanksgiving "Prom." Coach Klum and the team will be present as guests of honor and there will be speeches, school yells, songs and stunts by the students and alumni. A big time is looked for by everyone.

FIRST PICTURE OF YALE'S TOUCHDOWN AGAINST HARVARD, THE FIRST IN NINE YEARS: PART OF THE CROWD OF 80,000 PEOPLE



This picture, the first of the annual Yale-Harvard game played Saturday at New Haven, shows the gridiron warriors of Yale scoring their touchdown in the second period. It was the only touchdown of the game and the first time Yale crossed Harvard's goal line since 1907. This touchdown made possible Yale's first victory over Harvard since 1909, when the Elis won on field goals.

In a wonderful last ditch stand on the two-yard line, Harvard held three terrific plunges, then Neville, Yale halfback, forced his way across the line. This picture shows the teams piled up in the great play that decided the game.

The picture also shows a part of the wonderful crowd of 80,000 persons who packed the monster Yale bowl which entirely surrounds the playing field.

MEDFORD STUDENT WINS MILITARY HONOR
