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MEDFORD BOYS ARE RIVALS IN RUGBY

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Palo Alto, Cal., Dec. 4.—An interesting coincidence has come to light since the Stanford-Santa Clara football game, which is the "big game" of the year for the two schools.

Bob Pelouze of the Cardinals and "Rudy" Scholz of Santa Clara, who started the game playing opposite to each other at wing, claim the same Oregon town as their home, both coming from Medford.

These boys were well known in football circles in Oregon, having played on the Medford high school football team which established a good claim to the state title in 1912 by the defeat of Albany high school.

Both showed to good advantage in the rugby sport, outclassing some Californians who have played the game all their lives.

Both men weigh under 155 pounds. Scholz played on the All-American team against the All-British team at Oakland Thanksgiving day.

Chaire Seeley, also of Medford, a freshman this year, has shown good rugby talent, and cinched a place for himself as a fullback on the All-Blacks, the second string team.—Oregon Journal.

Under the head of coast defenses, \$45,328,000 is asked with which to purchase guns of all types.

The increase in the general item of fortifications and other works of defense for 1918 totals more than \$30,000,000 over last year.

To continue ships already building or authorized the department seeks \$18,946,155 for ships to be authorized this year, \$88,500,000.

It has been shown during the house naval committee's hearings, however, that the latter figure is much too small, even if the building program recommended is not exceeded.

With 40,000-ton battleships in prospect, while the figures are based on the 32,000-ton type last authorized, it is virtually certain that an increase of \$25,000,000 will be necessary before the program can be carried out.

Experimental air plane mail service between such points as he may determine. For railroad mail transportation, an estimate of \$69,350,000 is submitted, as compared with \$63,583,000 for the current year.

Miscellaneous Estimates. Among other miscellaneous estimates for new purposes are the following: \$25,000 for encouraging industry and self-support among natives of Alaska and to assist them in establishing small industrial enterprises; \$10,590,672 for the continuation of the government railroad project in Alaska; \$5,000 for the protection for the protection and improvement of Lassen volcanic national park, California; \$708,000 for two new vessels for the coast and geodetic survey; \$125,000 for eight or more new launches for the coast and geodetic survey; \$60,000 for the purchase and construction of vessels for the fisheries inspection service in Alaska; \$7,000 for completion of the fish cultural station at Irtatoga, Wyo.; \$25,000 for improvement in the Yes Bay, Alaska, fish cultural station; \$10,000 for further diffusion of useful information relative to protection, conservation and improvement of fishery resources.

In the game the Washington team forced the ball half of the length of the field repeatedly, only to lose it on downs when they threatened the Lincoln goal.

The game is to be played Tuesday, December 5, in the ball park. An admission of 5 cents will be charged to defray expenses.
