

ARMY POST FOR TACOMA IF DRILL LAND IS DONATED

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 4.—Under agreement between the secretary of war and a committee of Tacoma men, the commissioners of Pierce county today will call a special election, probably January 6, at which the people of the county will vote whether or not to vote a bond issue of \$2,000,000 with which to buy 70 thousand acres on the Nisqually plains for an army post.

The subject has been under consideration for several months. It has been engineered by Stephen Appleby, a banker, who, with a committee, recently visited the secretary of war in Washington city and obtained from him a written pledge to establish a division post at this point if the people will donate the land. President Wilson has taken the matter up as an administration policy and a number of prominent army officers, including Major General J. Franklin Bell, of the western department headquarters in San Francisco, are giving their support. The desirability of acquiring this site has been emphasized in a number of reports to the war department within the last dozen years.

The lands desired lie about 12 miles south of Tacoma, near American lake. It is nearly level, high and gravelly, with patches of fir and oak trees, and it includes the area, which for several years has been used as a state maneuver camp.

Largest Military Camp.

The agreement with the secretary of war calls for the location here of an army division, or about 670 officers and 15,000 men, and it will be the largest permanent military encampment in America. The government is prepared at once to expend about \$4,000,000 in making the site ready, in a temporary way, for the troops, and then will proceed to permanent construction, involving the expenditure of many millions of dollars. The annual payroll and food and forage bill will be about \$7,000,000.

The post is designed to become the maneuver ground for state troops of the northwest as far east as the Dakotas, and the authorities say that at times the total number of troops here will be 100,000.

The area embraces the land once held by the Hudson Bay company and its western boundary is only a short distance from Fort Steilacoom, an important early day post. The land will be acquired by condemnation proceedings and turned over to the federal government.

the Greek government was at fault in connection with the expulsion from Greece of the diplomatic representatives of the central powers, the reichstag was informed today by the foreign secretary, Sir Alfred Zimmerman. "On November 25 the Greek minister in Berlin, said Dr. Zimmerman, expressed the regret of the whole of Greece that Germans living in friendship were compelled to leave. ENFORCE SMALLPOX EDICT AT POINT OF SHOT GUNS

EL CENTRO, Cal., Dec. 4.—The town of Glamis, California, northeast of here was isolated Sunday when the imperial county health officers, with three automobile loads of deputies, enforced a quarantine with shotguns and ordered the Southern Pacific station agent not to allow incoming or outgoing trains to take on or discharge passengers. The action was taken when it was learned one man was dead and four were dying in the Mexican quarter from smallpox. The white residents of the town were vaccinated.

MINISTER TENDERS RESIGNATION, NEW MAN APPOINTED

THE HAGUE, Dec. 4.—Dr. Henry Van Dyke, American minister to The Netherlands, has resigned.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Dr. Van Dyke's resignation has been accepted and it is understood his successor virtually has been selected. The minister's resignation, it was said, was presented for purely private reasons, and it was recalled that he had been at his post nearly four years. The resignation probably will be followed by those of several other American diplomats. It is customary for heads of foreign missions to tender their resignations when a president is about to enter his second term or goes out of office.

Thaddeus A. Thomson, minister to Colombia, and William S. Hornbrook, minister to Siam, have sent in their resignations.

FIGHTING IN CARPATHIANS

LONDON, Dec. 4.—Lloyd's Shipping agency announces that the British ship King Bledyn has been sunk.

Normal Relations Established

LONDON, Dec. 4.—The Greek government has announced that the fullest protection will be given to the nationals of the entente, according to an Athens dispatch to Reuters. The government also guarantees that all legal rights of the arrested Venizelists will be respected. In palace circles it is said that normal relations with the allies are re-established.

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 4.—In a futile search for a mystic 200-year-old will which they believed bequeathed them a \$150,000,000 Dutch estate, Misses Pearl and Ambia Horner and their sister, Mrs. Ethel Moss, all of Portland, disguised as men, confessed here today that they held up their aged distant relatives, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Alumbaugh, with a revolver at Yamhill, Or., on the night of November 20 and ransacked their home, according to sheriff's deputies. One harmless shot was fired when a roomer resisted them.

The three sisters, with Harry Hosford of Portland, were arrested here Saturday night and charged with rioting. Pearl and Ambia Horner are aged 30 and 17, respectively, and Ethel Moss, 20. Hosford, it is charged, drove the girls to Yamhill.

Alumbaugh says no will exists and it is but a creation of the girls' imaginations, excited by mediums. Two of the girls recently, disguised as gypsy fortune tellers, read his palm, he said, and told him to give important papers which he held, into the custody of a Portland lawyer.

THE GREEK GOVERNMENT HAS ANNOUNCED THAT THE FULLEST PROTECTION WILL BE GIVEN TO THE NATIONALS OF THE ENTENTE, ACCORDING TO AN ATHENS DISPATCH TO REUTERS.
