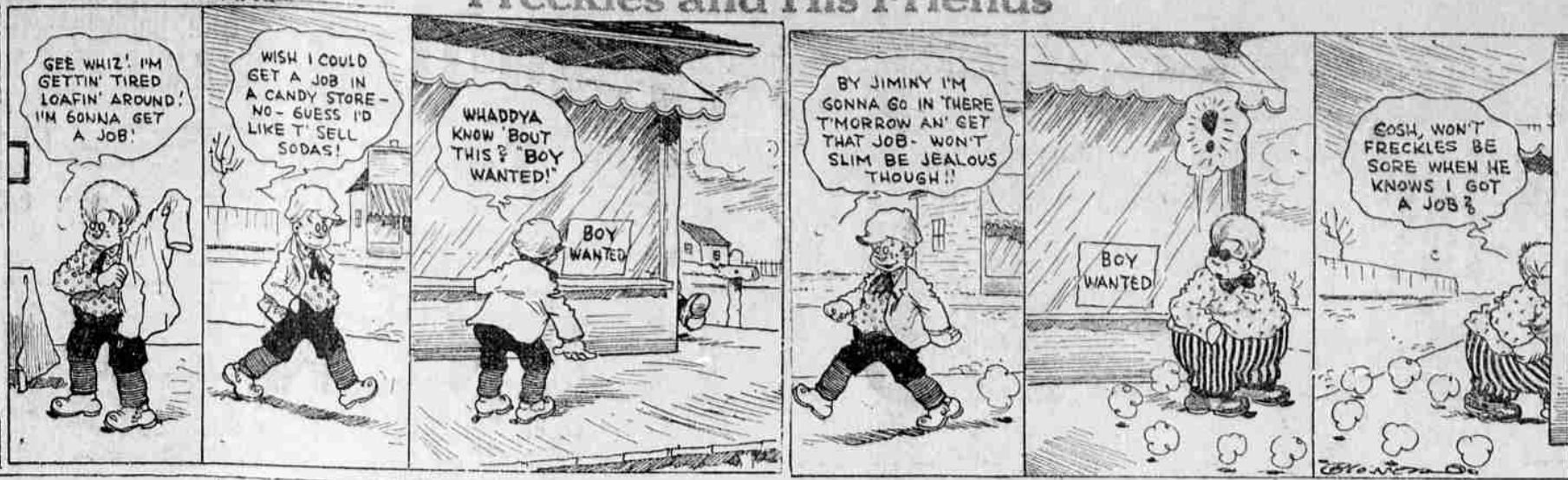

NORWEGIANS LOST 19 SHIPS IN NOVEMBER

LONDON, Dec. 8.—A Reuter dispatch from Christiania says it is announced by the Norwegian ministry of commerce that in November nineteen Norwegian vessels with a total tonnage of 32,993 were lost. The sinking of the Greek steamship Ipiros, 1084 tons gross, by a German submarine is reported in a Reuter dispatch from Las Palmas, Canary Islands. Reuter's correspondent at Stavanger, Norway, says the Norwegian steamship Stettin, 412 tons gross, has been sunk by a German submarine.
