BRYAN WIRES TO BRITISH PREMIER IN PEACE BEHALF

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 15.—William J. Bryan, here today on his way to Miami, Fla., stated that he had sent this message to the British premier:

"As a friend of the nations at war, as a Christian and as a lover of humanity, I respectfully, but most earnestly appeal to you to use your great influence to secure your government's consent to negotiations. There is no dispute that must necessarily be settled by force. All international disputes are capable of adjustment by peaceful means. Every guarantee that can possibly be secured by war can be stated as a condition precedent to peace. Do not, I pray you, by refusing an exchange of 'how's assume responsibility for a continuation of this unparalleled conflict. Your decision may mean life and death to millions."
