BOPP EMPLOYED SPIES TO WATCH CANADIAN TROOPS

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 22.—German espionage wire-taps were tapped; mail and telegrams watched, and a secret mechanical detector was installed in his office by enemies of his government, Franz Bopp, German consul general, testified in the United States district court today. He was on the witness stand defending himself against federal charges that he conspired with consular attaches in denounce ships and railroads in Canada and the United States to block shipments of munitions to Germany's enemies.

Bopp also declared in his direct testimony today that he hired spies to watch recruiting and shipments of Canadian troops to Europe for the information of the German general staff.

Existence of a "secret" German consular "war fund" in San Francisco amounting to more than \$100,000 was betrayed by Bopp on cross-examination.

WOMAN ARRESTED FOR SHOP LIFTING

Bonus check artists have been finding the Medford merchants easy marks, but the path of the shoplifter is not so easy. Mrs. Marie Otterdahl, a nurse, was accused of appropriating articles from a Medford store yesterday afternoon in a complaint filed before Justice Dax at Jacksonville.

A preliminary investigation was made Friday morning by Judge E. E. Kelly, at which a number of local merchants testified that Mrs. Otterdahl had been under surveillance in their stores. The articles found in her possession were dry goods, ties and other articles of small value.

The case will be heard by Justice Dax Tuesday morning.
