PEOPLE LONG FOR PEACE (Continued From Page One.) a responsibility; and from your previous notions I feel confident that you will use your power with a degree of vision and humanity rarely to be found among statesmen. "Even the men hitherto retained for making munitions, for dock labor and for other purposes essential to the prosecution of the war are gradually being drafted into the armies and replaced by women, with the sinister threat of colored labor in the background. There is a very real danger that if nothing is done to check the fury of national passion, European civilization as we have known it will perish as completely as it perished when Rome fell before the barbarians. Masses Tired of War. "From considerable personal experience, reinforced by all that I can learn from others, I believe that the desire for peace is almost universal, not only among the soldiers, but throughout the wage earning classes, and especially in industrial districts, in spite of high wages and steady employment. If a plebiscite of the nation were taken on the question of whether negotiations should be initiated, I am confident that an overwhelming majority would be in favor of this course, and that the same is true of France, Germany and Austria Hungary. "The United States government has the power not only to compel European governments to make peace, but also to reassure the populations by making itself the guarantor of the peace. Such action, even if it were resented by the governments, would be hailed with joy by the populations."

JUAREZ, Mex., Dec. 23.—General Francisco Gonzales announced at military headquarters today that General Jose Murguia, brother of General Francisco Murguia, military commander of the northeastern zone, would succeed him as commander of the de facto troops in the Juarez district. General Gonzales added that he would take the field in person against Francisco Villa south of Chihuahua City. DIED Harriet Chance Pierce, wife of R. A.
