NORWAY AND BRITAIN SETTLING DIFFICULTIES

LONDON, Jan. 6.—Great Britain has received Norway's reply in regard to the coal embargo and the situation is much improved, according to a Copenhagen dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company, quoting the Christiania Tidings. The consensus of opinion in the Norwegian press is that the differences between the two countries will soon be settled.

HARVEY FIELDS SUFFERS FROM ODD ACCIDENT

Harvey Fields, a clerk employed by C. M. Kidd, is suffering from an attack of blood poisoning as the result of a peculiar accident, which occurred near Christmas. His right thumb is infected but not seriously. Dr. Seely dressed the injury. Fields formed a slight water blister on his thumb, due to snowing, and during the Christmas season his brother killed five or six ducks on the river. He brought them home, and Fields to preserve them, packed them with snow and salt. The blister thus became infected from snow or salt, and in a couple of days the hand became black and highly discolored. Serious results were feared for a time.

SALMON CANNER SELLS INTERESTS FOR A MILLION

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 5.—Edward A. Sims, of Port Townsend, former member of the legislature, logger and salmon canner, announced today that he had disposed of his interests in the Hoonah Packing company, the Glacier Fisheries company, the Key City Packing company, and the Hillside Canning company and awarded a contract for the logging of the Rosewallis Timber company's holdings, which will be completed within five years. The various deals involve the transfer of properties roughly estimated at \$1,000,000.

E. B. Deming of Bellingham, took over Mr. Sims' interests in the Hoonah Packing company, and Arthur Pritchard of Tacoma purchased Mr. Sims' interests in the Glacier Fisheries company. The Hoonah Packing company has three Alaska canneries, one on Bering river at Katalla, a second at Hoonah and the third at Glacier Bay. Mr. Sims first purchased all the interests in the Key City Packing company plant at Port Townsend, then he made arrangements for transfer of his holdings, either to officers who have served him in the corporation or to friendly interests whom they might select.

The Hillside Canning company, another Port Townsend cannery with a capacity of 60,000 cases is taken over by Horace E. Sims, C. E. Goodrich and Peter Grainger, who have been associated with Mr. Sims in the fishing business. Mr. Sims' logging interests were taken over by Puget Sound men.

TWO-CENT LAW HOLDS IN ILLINOIS

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Judge Evin's Carpenter and Landis of the United States district court today denied the petition of 28 railroads operating in Illinois to restrain the state public utilities commission from enforcing the Illinois two-cent fare law. The railroads contended that a ruling of the interstate commerce commission permitting a passenger rate of 2.4 cents a mile in Illinois should set aside the state law.

EMMA GOLDMAN COLLECTS FUNDS MOONEY DEFENSE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6.—Emma Goldman, an anarchist of international reputation, is collecting funds for the murder defense of Thomas J. Mooney, a union organizer, on trial here as one of five alleged bomb plotters, according to a statement today by Miss M. Eleanor Fitzgerald, associate editor of Alexander Berkman's publication, the "Blatz." Miss Goldman always divides her lecture collections for the defense of accused persons identified with labor, said Miss Fitzgerald. "I don't know how much she has contributed to Mooney's defense. She has sent some money direct and some she has contributed through the International Workers' Defense League, which is financing the trial. Miss Goldman is also contributing to the defense of the industrial workers of the World members accused in the Everett, Wash., fight and she helped financially in the defense of Caplan and Schmidt in the Los Angeles Times case."

REPAIRING DAMAGE RUMAN OIL FIELDS

LONDON, Jan. 6.—A Ruter dispatch from Amsterdam quotes Berlin dispatches as saying that the work of repairing the damage in the Rumanian oil districts has advanced so far that some works may resume production within a few weeks. About 2000 carloads of petroleum are said to have been captured at Campina, and immense stores at Constantza.
