"PURITY" MOVIES CAUSES PROTEST FROM ASHLANDERS

A flurry of protest in senior circles was caused by the presentation here on Monday of the initial appearance in the movies at the Vitaphone of "Purity." A committee of representative women objected not only to the title but also to the pictures which were a part of the newspaper and illustrated advertising, notwithstanding that the production had been passed by the national and several metropolitan boards of censors. The local board is composed of the mayor, president of the board of education and chief of police. The ladies were referred to the manager of the Vitaphone, who agreed to "censor" any features which were proved to be objectionable. "Purity" evidently represents a series of status quo poses, the model being Miss P. J. McLaughlin, president of the Oregon branch of the American Poultry Association, who presided at the opening of the show free of charge Tuesday.

STATE POULTRY SHOW EXHIBITS NOW COMPLETE

Exhibits at the Poultry show being held in the Kotrick building on North Fir street are now complete, and judging of the birds has been commenced. In addition to over 400 choice chickens, pigeons, turkeys, rabbits and pheasants are shown.

A feature of the show is an exhibit of about 600 birds reared by school children of the city. Last year these youngsters were given eggs to hatch. A creditable display of fowl shows the interest they have taken. In line with the policy of encouraging the growing of poultry by the younger generation, the association has granted all school children the privilege of attending the show free of charge Tuesday.

While fewer birds are shown this year, the quality of poultry exhibited is much higher than that shown last year. A small entrance fee and the lessons learned at the last show have caused exhibitors to send out undesirable specimens.

The quality of the birds, the arrangement of the show building, the facilities for housing and display of the feathered stock has caused E. J. McCannahan, president of the Oregon branch of the American Poultry Association, to pronounce it "the classiest show ever held in Oregon south of Portland."

A lighting system has been arranged whereby the birds may be viewed after dark, and as a result the show will remain open each evening until 9 o'clock.

The judging, which is being done by K. F. Koenig of Eugene, is under the comparative method, prizes to be awarded as to the best fowl as a whole. Local farmers who wish to know more about the points of their birds will have them scored, following the following:

Thirty-eight varieties of fowls are shown, the birds running the best in numbers, with the Rocks second.

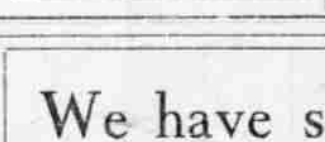

ENLARGE FACTORY FOR V-PLEX RINGS TO MEET DEMANDS

The V-Plex Ring company of Medford is planning to establish an eastern factory for the supplying of their famous piston rings to all territory east of the Rocky mountains.

The factory will be enlarged to take care of the territory west of this line. At the present time the local plant is able to manufacture about 200 rings per day, but the demand is growing at such a rapid rate that additional facilities will have to be provided in order to supply the trade from this point.

The patent office has issued patents on the ring, or rings, it might be called, as there are three sections to each ring, and an active advertising and sales campaign will be conducted.

They have just had some three-color calendars made from special plates, showing a side view of the ring with a Yanna Yanna girl pointing to the famous V-joint of the ring.

Appropriate wording is included. This was the product of the Medford Printing company and is a good specimen of the printing art. It will be supplied to all the large garages and supply houses on the coast. These will be followed with attractive wall cards from the same plates, the size of the latter being 14x22.

BATTLES SNOWDRIFTS ON TRIP TO TACOMA

T. M. Tomlinson, Jr., Drives His Maxwell Car Over 4000 Miles of Good, Bad and Indifferent Roads

Bound for Tacoma, where he intends to make his permanent home, T. M. Tomlinson, Jr., is at Medford, Ore., after a remarkable motor trip of 4611 miles, which began at Dallas, Texas, and was temporarily terminated when deep snowdrifts were encountered in the mountains of southern Oregon. In a letter just received Mr. Tomlinson describes his long trip as follows:

"I purchased a new 1917 Maxwell car in Dallas early in October, intending to drive to western Texas to visit friends, and thence to northern New Mexico, to investigate a business proposition with a view to locating there."

"Not regarding New Mexico with favor, we decided to push on to the coast, with Tacoma as our objective."

"Besides my wife and little boy, I loaded the car to the limit with household effects, including bedding, camp stove, tent, cups, fishing tackle, etc., and we set sail. The trip through Texas and New Mexico was uneventful, but the roads were very rough. They were still more so crossing Arizona and grades were encountered in the mountains that appeared too steep to be scaled by anything save a mountain goat. But the little 'Max' negotiated everything it was sent against and in due time we reached southern California. From the moment of entering the Golden State until the summit of the Sierrita range was reached, the trip was most delightful. The car drove grandly with pleasure at the best California highway, after its strenuous efforts in the wilds of the southwest."

"After suffering considerably from cold and the consequent hardships incidental to a motor trip through an extremely mountainous region in winter, we reached Medford and decided to go into winter quarters until spring, or until such time as the Pacific highway is passable through the hills that must still be crossed before the milder climate of the Willamette valley is reached."

"The performance of my car is certainly a tribute to the durability of the Maxwell. Although heavily loaded, and driven over almost impassable roads and trails strewn with rocks and boulders, the name little 'Max' never faltered and brought us through to Medford without having cost me a cent for repairs.
