ASHLAND AND VICINITY

The residence property of J. B. Ware on Liberty street has been sold to Paul Held of Crook county, one of the substantial ranchers in the vicinity of Prineville. The new purchaser is already in possession. His family name was bestowed upon the town of Held in that section of central Oregon. The sale was made by the Hodgson Realty Co.

In line with many previous records, not a single passenger's life was lost on the Southern Pacific last year as the result of train accidents, and in the past eight years only one such life has been forfeited. During the eight-year period the system carried 328,592,863 passengers an average distance of forty-two miles each, said to be the equivalent in passengers and mileage of transporting fourteen billions of people one mile each, statistics which assume fierce dimensions.
