WHIPPLE NAMED AS COUNSEL IN LEAK PROBE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Sherman L. Whipple of Boston, a demagogue and a noted trial lawyer, was named today as counsel in the leak probe.

Further police searches in the inquiry were postponed until Monday as the city spread and the committee time to prepare for the future proceedings. 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DEER POACHERS KILL BROOD SOW ON TYRRELL FARM

Tom Kinney, Roy Watkins and Carl Hammond were arrested Thursday, charged with stealing a hog from A. M. Tyrrell. The complaint was sworn to by Tyrrell and the arrest of the trio immediately followed. A preliminary hearing was held in Judge Glenn O. Taylor's court Friday and they were released on \$250 bonds each to appear for trial next Wednesday.

The story of the theft is that the three men arrested, who live in Medford, drove to Tyrrell's place, near the Lake Creek postoffice, Tuesday night and remained about a quarter of a mile from Tyrrell's house. The next morning the camp was vacated and one of Tyrrell's hogs was missing. Mr. Tyrrell and his neighbors examined the vacated camp and found several pieces of log meat hidden about the camp. Word was telephoned to the authorities, who went to the scene and gathered and brought to Medford evidence of the theft.

Game Wardens Driscoll and Walker in their examination of the camp also found evidence of the killing of deer.

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ONE DEATH FROM COLD AT BAKER

BAKER, Ore., Jan. 19.—A rising thermometer today gave Baker hope that warmer weather would soon come to replace the extreme cold and dispel the threatened coal famine which the town has faced for several days.

One death, that of an Austrian homesteader, thought insane, who left his home Wednesday, lightly clad, and has not been since seen, has resulted from the cold, it is believed. Searching parties who have scoured the hills near his homestead without avail have concluded he froze to death.

Two nights ago the thermometer stood at 5 below zero, but at day-break today had risen to 2 above. It is so cold here that a six-inch crust of ice formed on the surface of a well eighteen feet below the ground, according to the owners of the well.

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
