WHEAT DROPS FROM 5 TO 8 CENTS, PORTLAND  
PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 1.—Wheat dropped from 5 to 8 cents on the Portland market today as a result of the German note. Spot bluestem, which yesterday sold at \$1.58, today was \$1.59. Spot club fell from \$1.50 to \$1.45. Futures were from 7 to 8 cents lower. The decline was the greatest here in several months.

The agency of the selling indicated that latest developments had aroused grave apprehension in the most conservative quarters. Prices crumbled again during the early afternoon session, although the selling was more moderate. Steel fell back three points. The renewed liquidation was attributed to reports from Washington that a break between the United States and Germany seemed imminent. A few specialties, including oils, incentive equipments and Atlantic, Gulf and West Indies, were lower in the last hour, leaders, however, making feeble rallies from lowest levels. The closing was weak. Incessant liquidation based wholly on the unexpected turn in international conditions caused a violent upheaval in today's market, with only nominal recoveries. Sales were estimated at 2,000,000 shares.

ASHLAND MEETS MEDFORD FRIDAY IN BASKET BALL

In a comparison of the members of the C. A. C. basketball team of Ashland and the high school team of Medford, Ashland seems to have the better chance in Friday night's contest on the local floor. However, the local boys have shown great improvement in each game and a close contest is expected by fans. Milford Grubb, captain and forward of the Ashland team has played on the Ashland high school team two years and is now playing his fourth season with the company team. He is heady, is probably the best dribbler in southern Oregon and is an excellent shot. Opposed to him in Friday's game will be Young, who is playing his second year of high school basketball. Young is lighter than his opponent but is a good defensive player. Larkin Grubb, the second Ashland forward, is playing his fourth season with the team. He is the steadiest player on the team and has the faculty of playing the ball in the basket from difficult angles. Opposed to him either Wallace or Olmstead will play. Wallace is a first year man who showed up well against Cottage Grove. Olmstead substituted on the team last year. Bert Freeman is the Ashland center, playing his fourth year in that position. Through his shooting ability and clever passing he made five baskets off the Cottage Grove center who was unable to make a score. Delbert Jones, of Medford, will oppose him. Jones is playing his first year, but is fairly fast in spite of his size. Arthur Long is playing his first year on the company team after putting in a year with the high school squad. He is a natural player of the "sticker" type. Opposed to him will be Coleman, another first year Medford man. Coleman is expected to put up a game in spite of his handicap of light weight. Charles Delsman, the second Ashland guard is perhaps the best man in that position in this section. He has played three years on the high school team and two years on the company team. He is fast in spite of his weight of 195 pounds. Gen-

try, another first year man will oppose him and being of the staying type will put up a good defense. Medford Wednesday afternoon played a practice game with Phoenix high school in which the local team showed decided improvement over their performance against Cottage Grove in last week's games. On account of eye trouble Brandon is out of the game, probably for several weeks. A preliminary game between girls' teams will begin at the Sat at 7:30 the main game beginning at 8 o'clock.

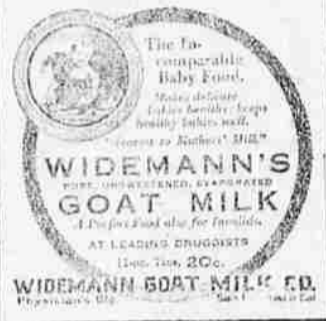
OBITUARY

SPANELL FREED FOR MURDERING WIFE

SAN ANGELO, Tex., Feb. 1.—A verdict of not guilty was returned after less than two hours deliberation today by the jury in the case of Harry J. Spanell of Alpine, Tex., tried on a charge of killing his wife, Crystal Holland Spanell last July. A appeal venire had been ordered into the district court here today in the case in which Spanell is charged with the killing of Lieutenant Colonel M. C. Butler, but was excused yesterday. Spanell was not in court to hear the verdict, which was cheered by many spectators. The decision in the Butler case will not be announced until tomorrow, but it was stated reliably that it would not be final here. Mrs. Spanell and Lieutenant Colonel Butler of the Sixth cavalry, United States army, were shot and killed July 29 last, when in an automobile in which they were driving with Spanell, a short time after the party had
