PRETTY GIRLS SELL TAGS FOR COPPER DAY

Tomorrow will be Tag day for Copper Community day. Revies of pretty girls from the high school and other circles in the city will tag the unsuspecting loiterer on the street and sell him a copper specimen that will be worth more than the sum received. It is from the rich copper ore now being shipped from the Blue Ledge mine to the Tacoma smelter. To the tag is attached a specimen of ore that, according to assay by Mr. Liljegrøn, runs about 20 per cent copper. The gold and silver content is also considerable. On the tag is printed: "Medford's Greatest Resource. Copper is King."

Miss Laura Gates is assisting Mrs. C. J. Schreffelin, chairman of the Tag day committee, to engage the girls to sell the tags. It will be a competitive sale, two attractive prizes being offered to those who lead in the sales, one being for the highest and the other for the second.

The object of the sale of tags is to obtain money with which to defray certain expenses connected with arrangement for Copper Community day, on which will be held a celebration of the first shipment of ore from the Blue Ledge when the returns shall have been received from the Tacoma smelter, to which thirty-four tons were shipped. The publicity feature of the distribution of the tags in that manner is also to be taken into account, as the scheme is essentially a publicity campaign.

Window displays of the ore have been made to the number of 125. Appropriate cards, on which information concerning the district will be printed, have not yet been placed. Business men will need the cards to hand to those who may desire data concerning the ore and the vast copper field from which it came.

Preparation for Copper Community day exercises and for the special copper edition of a local daily is progressing substantially.

ANXIETY FELT FOR STEAMERS NOW AT SEA

American Liners in Danger in War Zone—Philadelphia With 148 Passengers Crippled at Sea—Finland With 111 Passengers in Mid-Ocean—Foreign Liners Endangered.

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—Owners of American vessels in trans-Atlantic trade probably will follow the example of the shipowners of the entente nations and abide by the instructions of their government in regard to running the risks of the new German blockade regulations.

Unless orders to the contrary are received from Washington the American liner St. Louis will sail from here Saturday for Liverpool. The vessel of the American line, whose safe arrival is awaited with the greatest anxiety is the Philadelphia, from New York to Liverpool. This morning the Philadelphia was believed to be about 1200 miles from Liverpool. Her port engine is out of commission, due to the breaking of a crank shaft last Saturday and it is believed that she cannot make port until late Monday.

Vessel Crippled at Sea. The Philadelphia carries 148 passengers of whom thirty-five are Americans. Among those on board are Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, the Misses Helen and Ethel Crocker of San Francisco; Lieutenant John Eager, U. S. A., and Captain Ronald Augusten, antarctic explorer.

The Finland, of the same line, also from New York, is due to arrive at Liverpool on Sunday. Forty-six of her 111 cabin passengers are Americans. The Kronland, of this line, left Liverpool for New York on Wednesday with 191 passengers. It is believed that half of these are Americans.

The French liner Chicago, which carries a number of American passengers is thought to be due at Bordeaux today. Another vessel on which Americans sailed is the Baltic, of the White Star line, due to arrive in Liverpool next Wednesday. The St. Paul of the American line, which left Liverpool last Saturday and is due here Sunday, is believed to be outside the danger zone by this time.

Liners Keen in Port. No passenger steamers have left New York for Europe since the declaration of the German blockade, but several freight ships sailed yesterday and last night.

Agents of the Dutch and Danish steamers have discontinued sailings while awaiting orders from their governments. Cable advices received here, say that the Dutch government has provisionally forbidden the sailing of all vessels from Holland and

that Denmark has suggested that shipowners do not permit their ships to leave port without first consulting the government.

Army officers commanding the forts that guard New York harbor have detailed extra guards to the most important batteries and stationed additional sentinels to patrol the water front and the country inland for some distance from the fortifications.

According to information given out at the headquarters of the Belgian relief commission, Germany's new naval policy will not interfere with the passage of relief ships between this country and Europe.

Bernstorff Prepared. The German embassy continued its

official silence, calmly prepared for the break Count Von Bernstorff has said privately he expects but serenely confident that the German governments' action irrespective of the protests of neutrals, will be the winning factor of the war.

The entente embassies fully expecting the United States to break with Germany, seem to be confident that the new campaign of ruthlessness will be of little greater effectiveness than the campaign which the entente governments contend the German submarines have been waging all along despite the pledges given in the Sussex note. A few more ships may be sunk, they think, but they expect the British navy to meet the new attack successfully.
