ASK INTERVENTION FOR SWITCH STRIKE
NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—Railroad managers received word here today from Chicago that an appeal had been made there by the General Managers' association, representing eighteen large railroads entering Chicago, to the federal board of mediation and conciliation to intervene in a threatened strike of Chicago switchmen.

An ultimatum has been placed before the Chicago Managers' association, it was stated, after a sudden strike vote. The grievances related to schedules which have been effective since 1910, and the eighteen roads affected regarded the demands as of minor importance.

It was asserted here that if the strike threatened should occur Chicago would be virtually cut off from the rest of the country by rail, inasmuch as the yards of that city could not be operated.

475 IRRIGATION DITCHES WASTING FISH IN COUNTY
Fred N. Cummings, county water master, reports that there are 475 ditches from the Rogue and its tributaries in Jackson county, extending Big Butte and some other streams. With the exception of perhaps half a dozen, none are screened to protect fish fry.

"This list," said Mr. Cummings, "is not an accurate one, but is substantially correct as far as my records show. These records are now being revised by the state board, and some changes will mean that still in all probability show an increase in the number as listed.

BRITISH SAILING VESSEL IS SUNK
LONDON, Feb. 6.—The British sailing vessel Belford has been sunk, Lloyd's Shipping agency announced today.

The British ship Belford of 3955 tons gross, was last reported sailing from San Francisco on August 23 for Plymouth. The Belford carried 67,323 cwt of barley, valued at \$104,990.

Lloyd's also announces that the Norwegian bark Tamara, of 453 tons, is believed to have been sunk.

The Tamara sailed from Black River, Jamaica, on December 6 for Fleetwood, according to marine reports.
