Delegations from all over Jackson county will occupy the 21st seats at the Lincoln cent banquet and reception held at the Hotel Medford tonight. A varied program has been provided, which will begin at 8 o'clock. Among the numbers on the program will be an address by Judge Charles L. McNary of Salem, state chairman of the republican central committee, the principal speaker of the evening. Miss Louise Case Baker, special correspondent of the Oregonian, will give a short talk. Rev. J. C. Collins will deliver the Lincoln day address. Local people will supply the musical features of the program, including music by an orchestra and patriotic selections under the direction of George Anderson. Colonel E. C. Washburn will be master of ceremonies in the capacity of toastmaster. Exhibited at the banquet will be a painting of Foster Lake, the work of Tip Risher, a local artist. Arrangements were made this morning for the showing of the picture, which is of the improvement school. Fifty persons will attend from Ashland, in addition to smaller delegations from other valley points.

BARDWELL ENTERS FRUIT SHIPPING, SUPPLY BUSINESS

Ralph Bardwell, associated with Medford fruit houses for the past six years, has been appointed representative in this city for the Stewart Fruit Co. He has leased the Western warehouse, which is being remodeled and enlarged and will handle sprays and orchard supplies in addition to fruit. The new organization will be known as the Bardwell Fruit Co. The Stewart Fruit Company is well known in the valley. It assisted in the shipping of the first Rogue river valley pears, which were sent to Eastern markets 26 years ago. From 1890 to 1911 this company distributed a large percentage of the fruit of the section realizing some of the highest prices ever obtained for fruit from this section. The Stewart Fruit Company has its own offices in all the principal western markets and carries through exclusive representatives, every large fruit consuming center on the continent, operating on the principle of sending fruit to the point of greatest demand, rather than to any fixed center. The advent of the new company is a strong addition to the fruit marketing facilities of this section.

SERMON AGAINST FOX TROTTING AS WORST OF EVILS
