CROWD FLOCKS TO HEAR FIRST BONE DRY CASE

The case of the State of Oregon vs. Ed Lamport, Medford harness dealer, accused of illegally importing liquor into the state, was begun in Justice Taylor's court this afternoon. The case is creating more interest and attracting larger crowds than any held in the city during the past year. The case was opened at 2 o'clock this afternoon and the work of selecting a jury was begun. At the end of the first hour only one jurymen had been passed unchallenged. Two suit cases of liquor and a packing box containing twenty-four quarts of beer, seized in a raid on Lamport's home two weeks ago, will be introduced as evidence. The case of beer bears a Wells Fargo express label and is directed to H. Hawkins, Medford. The fact that the beer was found in Lamport's home indicates, according to those who conducted the raid, that Lamport obtained it through indirect consignment, contrary to the prohibition laws. The beer was shipped on January 25. The conductor and brakeman of the train on which Lamport is alleged to have brought in the two suitcases of liquor from Hornbrook, will be two of the state's principal witnesses.
