DEUTSCHLAND BRITISH PRIZE. CAPTAIN AND CREW JAILED

BALTIMORE, Feb. 17.—That the merchant submarine Deutschland has been captured and that he saw her in Plymouth harbor with 186 other German submarines was the statement made here today by William Palmer, second engineer of the American transport liner Mongolia. Palmer said that the British had captured 400 enemy submarines and that 187 of them are in Plymouth chained together and in the center of a huge network of chains attached to buoys and wharves.

Captain Koenig, commander of the submarine freighter and his crew are in English jails, said Palmer. The Mongolia left Plymouth January 27 and arrived at New York February 7. Palmer was formerly an engineer here with the Chesapeake Steamship company.

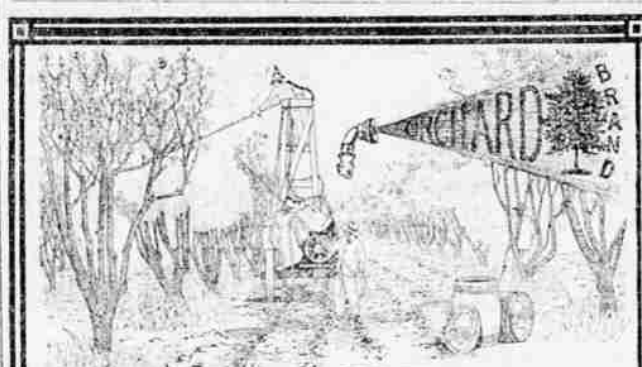
