WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Ambassador Elkus at Constantinople probably will be instructed by the state department to begin negotiations to have the Ottoman government arrange with Germany for the American naval collier Caesar and the cruiser Des Moines to enter Beirut and bring out the 1,900 American refugees waiting there. The two ships now are virtually war-bound at Alexandria, laden with food supplies for Armenians and Syrians for delivery at Beirut in the zone which Germany has proclaimed barred by submarines. The state department has refrained from negotiating directly with the German government for sending the ships to Beirut, the position being taken that if the request were made it would, in effect, be a recognition of the German blockade.
