MEDFORD WINS SECOND GAME FROM ROSEBURG 21 TO 17

Medford Friday night dropped her "excuse me please, I didn't mean to push you" tactics of Thursday night and with a little laughing and mixing, redeemed her defeat of Thursday by taking the second game of the series with Roseburg by a score of 21-17. The showing of the Medford team Thursday was a disappointment to all who witnessed it, the locals hanging around the edges while Roseburg worked like a perfectly oiled machine. Following the game the Medford players were handed stiff jolts by Coach Klum, which judging by the severe last night must have effectively splintered up the Medford fighting spirit. It is hard to say who starred for the locals, every man showing up splendidly in his position. Jones set the pace for the Medford tactics, both as to speed and style of play. Wilhamson covered his man well, succeeded in annexing most of Medford's point with good shooting and might have piled the score higher had he not attempted to convert too many shots of the horseshoe variety. Brandon played the Roseburg star center, Jewett, off his feet, getting his goal after the first ten minutes of play. Young and Wallace both mixed it with heavier opponents, though both had a little hard luck, through their opponents dropping in horseshoe shots. Roseburg started the game with a rush, piling up seven points before the change in Medford's tactics put on the brakes. Shortly thereafter the locals jumped into the lead, which they held by a small margin

until the last few moments of play which Medford led by two baskets. At the beginning of the second half Roseburg showed a flash of her old machine play, making a basket in about three seconds by the center hooking the ball into the hands of a guard, the guard passing to a forward, who dropped it into the basket with a perfect shot. The games between the Medford girls' team and the Central Point girls' team, was won by Medford 7 to 3, retrieving a defeat of the night before by the same team. The crowd was small considering the class of basketball played, which in speed and cleverness is rarely seen in intercollegiate contests. The basketball championship of southern Oregon will be decided Monday night at the Natatorium when Medford will meet Roseburg. The largest crowd of the season is expected to be in attendance. DIED BLAKELEY—Mrs. Fred J. Blakeley, wife of a well known Roseburg promoter, formerly interested in the Sterling mine in the Appelgate and well known in Medford, died at her home in Roseburg, Wednesday morning, Feb. 21, at the age of 56 years. Mrs. Blakeley was born in Toledo, Ohio, where her father was mayor for several terms. She was an active member of the W. R. C., and was a leader in social and church circles.
