

# FUNSTON BURIED WITH MILITARY HONORS PRESIDIO

Body of Major General Interred in National Cemetery San Francisco—Services Held at Church and Cemetery—Activities Cease in City Following Farewell Salute.

**SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 24.**—The body of Major General Frederick Funston, who died in San Antonio Monday night, was interred in the national cemetery at the Presidio here today at 12:30 p. m. The cemetery next services were held in a driving rain, but the sun shined out from a rift in the clouds a minute later as the Presidio guns boomed out thirteen times, a last salute.

**Military Escort.**  
Although the general's rank called for a military escort of 22,000 men, a full division, military expenses reduced this number to a mixed brigade of coast artillery and blue-jackets—the major general, three brigadier generals and a rear admiral stood here headed beside the grave when the Rev. William Kirk Guthrie read the service. Three volleys of rifle fire over the grave presided; there was an instant's pause and the troops plodded away through the mud and rain, to the sound of the major general's salute of thirteen guns. The four of artillery was a signal for the cessation of all possible activities in the city for a period of two minutes.

The body left its embowered entombment in the rotunda of the city hall at 10 o'clock and the march to the grave in the national cemetery in the presidio was begun with 2,000 coast artillerymen escorting the flag-draped casket on a caisson, through the rain. Behind the gun caisson bearing Funston's casket walked his horse with head unbridled and draped in black.

**Church Services.**  
The First Presbyterian church at Van Ness avenue and Sacramento streets, was reached at 10:30 and as the stalwart enlisted pallbearers, who were under Funston on the border carried the casket into the church "Lead Kindly Light" came in hushed tones from the choir.

The front of the church was banked with floral tributes.  
The Rev. W. K. Guthrie read the scripture. The choir sang "Just for Today." Then Rev. Guthrie spoke the eulogy and afterward prayer.  
In his eulogy, Rev. Guthrie said: "He was a man of deeds, not words, and to say more of him would be displeasing to his soul."  
"A deep in Jesus," by the choir and benediction brought the ceremony in the church to a close. The church was nearly filled with spectators.

# TAX ON BACHELORS ORDERED IN PRUSSIA

**LONDON, Feb. 24.**—August von Lottum, Prussian minister of finance has announced a new service tax on bachelors according to a Berlin telegram transmitted by the Reichstag telegraph company's Copenhagen correspondent.  
Families with children on the other hand, the announcement states, will be relieved of a part of the burden in ordinary taxation, according to the number of their children.

# BORDEAUX EYES ARE ON YANKEE SHIPS

**BORDEAUX, Feb. 24.**—The people of this city are manifesting the greatest interest in the waters of the American freighters Rochester and Orleans and are hoping that they will be able to run the blockade successfully. While waiting news of the boats, preparations are being made for a hearty welcome to the crews if they succeeded in reaching Bordeaux safely.

The unarmed American steamers Rochester and Orleans left New York February 16 for Bordeaux and their arrival there has not yet been reported. Except for one vessel they were the first ships carrying the American flag to leave the United States after the publication of the Germany note January 21. Both vessels have a majority of Americans in their crews. At the time of their departure it was said they should arrive at Bordeaux within fourteen to sixteen days.

# PACIFIC COAST IS WELL STOCKED WITH FOODSTUFFS

**SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 24.**—Thousands of tons of foodstuffs on the Pacific coast are awaiting purchase and shipment west. Of rice alone there are 125,000,000 pounds, much of which is ready for shipment and the price is lower than it has been for several years. In fact, so fast that millers have been holding it.

Although no details were available authorities said there were millions of bushels of potatoes and beans besides canned and dried fruit and vegetables a plenty.

The San Francisco chamber of commerce telegraphed the interstate commerce commission asking it to permit the use of 25¢ refrigerator cars immediately to ship canned foods which are subject to the low eastern temperatures. The Pacific Fruit Express is retaining all "road" freight, accepting nothing else—worthwhile foodstuffs.

A traffic expert of the chamber of commerce estimated that California could export between 200 and 300 cars of foodstuffs a day if the proper cars were available. This would include canned goods, fruits, beans, potatoes and various vegetables besides dried fruits, such as prunes and apricots.

# AMERICAN LINER PASSES U-BOAT ZONE

**NEW YORK, Feb. 24.**—The American line steamship Finland carrying 166 passengers, among them Dr. Henry Van Dyke, former American minister to The Netherlands, sailed from Liverpool on February 17 and is due here next Tuesday or Wednesday, the American line announced today. She is now presumed to be safely beyond the submarine zone.

# GERARD RECEIVED BY KING ALPHONSO

**MADRID, Feb. 24.**—James W. Gerard, former United States ambassador to Germany, will be received by King Alfonso today and later will be the guest at a luncheon at the American embassy at which Sir Arthur Henry Hardinge, British ambassador to Spain, will be present. Mr. Gerard will leave tomorrow night for Valencia, where he will embark for America.

# IMPORTERS OF AMERICAN GOODS HIT BY EMBARGO

**LONDON, Feb. 24.**—Importers of American goods feel themselves particularly hard hit by the latest restrictions upon imports, but the extent of their loss can be only approximated until they learn just how liberally licenses will be granted for importations of forbidden wares.

The goods most drastically affected and which have been imported in considerable quantity since millions annually from America include agricultural machinery, typewriters and other office equipment, boots and shoes, cotton hosiery, apples, wood and cut

timber. Cotton hosiery was on the previous prohibited list, but was recently removed by the government.  
Many items, included in the latest list, so far as importations were concerned, have only been allowed to enter under license for some time past, but importers have started under a feeling that such favoritism has been shown in the issuance of such licenses. They now expect a more even system of administration.  
Rice and shoe importers are particularly alarmed over the latest decision, although they have long been expecting such action.
