ASHLAND AND VICINITY

The special election set for Saturday, March 3, to pass upon the proposition of purchasing Chautauqua park by the city, has been postponed. The council at its regular session March 6 will specify a later date. Reason of the change is attributed to a desire to afford more time in which to decide on the merits of the plan and to avoid possible complications.
