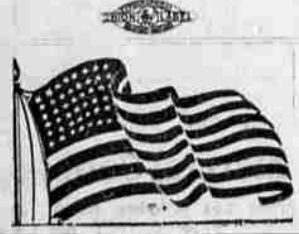

NO CHANCE FOR PERMANENT PEACE SAYS ADVENTIST

Pastor I. H. Evans, of the North American division conference of Seventh-Day Adventists, Washington, D. C., arrived in the city today. He is visiting the leading churches of the denomination in the northwest and will speak at their meeting house tonight. Mr. Evans has been connected with the Seventh-Day Adventist people for a number of years and is a thorough Bible student.

These people have established quite a reputation for the correct interpretation of bible prophecies. He was asked why the Adventists give so much study to the prophecies of the bible, and replied, "The Lord gave these prophecies as a sort of cyclopaedia view of the future, so that the church might know the times in which she lives. They were not written to be hidden or held from understanding. We have some great world-wide prophecies in the book of Daniel, outlining the rise and fall of nations. In the eleventh and twelfth chapters is the prophecy concerning our present 'eastern question' and the events immediately following its culmination. In Revelation we have several outlines of world events. Among other nations plainly brought to view is the United States of America, and it is very plainly declared that this nation is to become a world power, whose plans and policies will be followed and imitated by other nations. However, it is not a pleasing outlook of what the United States will do in the future. A close study of these various lines of prophecy makes one intelligent concerning important world events."

When asked regarding the present war situation, he said: "There are some prophecies in the bible which clearly indicate that in the last days the nations will be angry, and that this condition will continue to the very end of the world's history. The Savior also associates these wars and the famines, pestilences and earthquakes with the sorrows attending the close of the age. Surely we could not ask for more definite fulfillment than we see in current events. We do not know to what this war will lead. We have expected a time of peace before the end, when the nations would prepare for the great battle of Armageddon. Every Christian ought to pray the Lord to save the United States from becoming involved in this awful international calamity."

"But do you not think that the efforts now being made will lead to a permanent and international peace?" he was asked.

No Permanent Peace.

"No," he said. "It would seem, from my knowledge of the teachings of the Scriptures, that this is not to be expected in the last days. I do not think that we can look for any permanent peace in the future. The times will become more and more troublous, though we may for a little season have quiet. We must expect a greater commotion than has taken place, for in the book of Revelation we learn that the whole world is to be aroused to a last great battle, the which ends in Armageddon, and culminates ultimately in the coming of our Lord."

PRUSSIAN DUPLICITY

THE duplicity and hypocrisy of the Prussian juggler are laid bare in the astounding proposal made Mexico of a triple alliance of Germany, Mexico and Japan to attack the United States. Such a proposal is born of the imperial desperation. "Whom the gods would destroy, they first make mad."

The plot is in keeping with Germany's foreign policy, with the Machiavellism that rules the empire. Like the Assyrian of old, the German rulers seek triumph through the destruction and enslavement of humanity, and no phase of frightfulness is too awful to employ, no friendship valued enough not to betray, no friendship so sacred it will not be sacrificed.

Since the kaiser first determined that the time was ripe for Germany to conquer the world, he has interfered among the factions of Mexico, seeking to embroil the United States in a struggle that would center attention and absorb their energies so that he would be given a free hand in Europe. While German agents were blowing up munition plants in friendly United States, conducting propaganda to influence public sentiment, interfering with elections, and seeking to divide the nation, other agents were busy in Mexico.

It is not a mere coincidence that whenever relations between the United States and Germany became strained, the border lawlessness assumed menacing proportions. When the Lusitania tragedy of May 7, 1915, precipitated a crisis, Huerta, the deposed dictator, backed by German money and German agents, was plotting violence. His arrest in June caused Von Rintelen's plans to miscarry and his death prevented the revelation of the plot at his trial.

While the crisis precipitated by the sinking of the Ancon on November 9, 1915, was intensifying the submarine issue, the attack by Mexicans upon American troops upon their own soil took place at Nogales.

The sinking of the Persia, December 30, 1915, was followed by the massacre of Americans at Santa Ysabel, January 10, 1916. German propagandists sought to commit the American congress to abandon American rights upon the sea at the kaiser's dictation, and the defeat of the proposal was followed by the Mexican raid upon Columbus, N. M., of March 8. New border depredations and renewed activity by Villa preceded the renewal of U-boat warfare. The battle of Parral and other outrages were traced directly to the ceaseless activity of German agents, who have financed the Mexican bandits.

The German viewpoint is incomprehensible to citizens of the United States. The difference between psychology of the Prussian military caste and that of citizens of self-ruling democracies is as wide as the sea. It is this difference that is the fundamental cause of the great war. It is this difference that has caused the break between the United States and Germany.

In a recent issue of the Westminster Gazette, ante-dating the break between America and Germany, Gilbert Murray gives his interpretation of the irreconcilable conflict between the Prussian mental attitude toward militarism and the mental attitude of the rest of the world. We take the liberty of publishing the following synopsis:

"We all remember the old philosophic doctrine of the 'social contract' as the origin of ordered society; that men lived at first in a 'state of nature,' with no laws, no duties to one another, no relationship—every man a wolf to every other man—and, then finding that condition intolerable, they met together and made a contract, and hence arose civilized society. Before any contract is possible there must be at least the elementary understanding that if a man pledges his word he should keep it."

"It is that primary understanding, that elementary sense of brotherhood or of public right, which it seems to us the present government of Germany in its dealing with foreign nations has sought to stamp out of existence. It has rejected the old ordinance which has held civilized Europe together. It has acted on a new ordinance that every nation shall be a wolf to its neighbor."

"Put baldly thus, this degree of wickedness will seem hard to believe of such a nation as Germany. The neutral will suspect that we are just venting our anger in abuse. But I think we can see how it came about. Germany is the great country of specialization. Above all, she has produced the specialized soldier, the Christian soldier, the chivalrous soldier, or the soldier with the sense of civil duties; but the soldier who is trained to be a soldier and nothing else, to disregard all the rest of human relations, to see all his country's neighbors merely as enemies to be duped and conquered, to see all life according to some system of perverted biology as a mere struggle of force and fraud. The Germans have created this type of soldier, able, concentrated, conscienceless and remorseless; and then—what no other people in the world has done—they have given the nation over to his guidance."

"Of course we all have armies. We all have military experts and strategists. But with the rest of us the soldier is the last resort, like the executioner. We call him up only when all other means have failed. But in Germany the soldier is always present. He is behind the diplomatist, behind the educator, behind the preacher; he is behind the philosopher in his study and the man of science in his laboratory; always present and always in authority."

"In other nations the sword is the servant of the public welfare, a savage servant never used but in the last necessity; in Germany all the resources of the nation, its banks and railways, its schools and universities, its very religion and philosophy, are the servants of the sword."

"It is this which gives to our present war something of the quality of a crusade against the infidel. It is this which makes peace so difficult and confidence so impossible. It was something approaching to this which made it impossible for Europe to live at peace with Napoleon; for the other Italian states to live at peace with Cesare Borgia."

"And the tragedy is that, in each case, so much devotion and such great virtues should be used merely as tools toward a purpose which the human conscience rejects as intolerable."

ORES AVERAGE RICH IN VALUES IN LOCAL DISTRICTS

A conservative opponent of everything good and reasonable, a man whose paucity of ideas is equalled only by the dearth of storage-room under his pompous front, but who cheerily deceives himself into the happiness that other people have overlooked the deficiency, should be unreservedly complimented for having discovered that the deficiency really exists. I have said in all kindness that he's convalescent. His own discovery proves it. Hope runs concurrently with the thread of life.

Said this convalescent person this morning: "Mr. Mills, who said in an interview yesterday that many thousands of dollars' worth of modern machinery is being shipped to low-grade mining propositions in Alaska, might have some difficulty to prove it." And then this unhappy individual, for whose recovery faint hope is entertained, said other things unworthy to be printed in a clean column like this.

Carpenter is Good Authority. Frank G. Carpenter, beloved by everybody who delights to read about what the world is doing, wrote from Alaska during a recent visit there:

"Coming north from Seattle, I saw my first great gold properties on Douglas Island, just opposite Juneau. These were the Treadwell mines, which have been manufacturing gold, as it were, for more than 35 years. They have taken out something like 30,000,000 tons of ore and from it have extracted more than \$50,000,000. The gold so far taken out has averaged only \$2.42 a ton, and that low average has paid an enormous profit for 35 years."

"Just across the channel * * * are several mountains of gold which some of the great capitalists are just beginning to work. They have already spent millions of dollars in prospecting and developing and they will make fortunes out of ore, whose average gold contents are almost \$1 less than those at the Treadwell mines. The Alaska Gastineau properties from which the owners expect to be mining gold for a century to come, are landing ore worth on the average only \$1.50 a ton; and the same is true of the Alaska Juneau, the Kibber and other large mines in that territory."

The gold mining of today is a manufacturing proposition, instead of a gambling business, as formerly. It is more than formerly an industrial problem. Mining properties which our forefathers could not have mined profitably at all are now yielding millions of dollars to modern methods.

Mr. Thane, manager of the Gastineau properties, said to Mr. Carpenter: "We will gladly pay \$50,000 to any inventor who can show us how to save one cent a ton in getting out gold. One cent per ton would mean a saving of \$100 a day on one 10,000-ton product. It would mean over \$35,000 a year; and a saving of 10 cents a ton would mean a saving of \$1000 a day. So, you see, we can afford to pay for the best of machinery."

The plant of the Thane properties had reduced the cost of power 20 cents per ton less than that of the Treadwell mines, which is a saving of \$2000 a day on a 10,000-ton daily output.

Many people have this information, of course; but many other persons do not read for information. About the only good they get out of it is in the form of acute headache.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—The federal reserve board approved the following discount rates for the federal reserve bank of San Francisco: Paper maturing within 15 days 3 1/2 per cent; 16 to 30 days paper 4 per cent; 31 to 60 days paper 4 1/2 per cent; trade acceptances, 30 to 90 days, 3 1/2 per cent; agricultural paper 90 to 180 days 3 1/2 per cent; bank acceptances, 30 to 90 days 2 to 4 per cent.
