

PORTLAND MAYOR WIRES DELEGATION TO AID PRESIDENT

PORTLAND, March 3.—Mayor Albee has sent the following telegram to members of Oregon's congressional delegation at Washington: "In God's name, I wish to urge you to stand by our president and our nation in this trying time. Give no heed to those who, perhaps unwittingly, lend aid and comfort to an opposing force by sending forth to the world the false impression that a large proportion of our citizens are wrapped up in the propaganda of peace that the nation's honor is lost sight of and that as weaklings we will refuse to protect those who with justifiable expectancy look to the Stars and Stripes as the emblem of liberty and the enemy of oppression. "I have been asked by those taking requested concerted action to telegraph you urging peace at any price, and my answer is this message to you urging you to put honor first and peace second, for peace without honor would blot out nearly a century and a half of glorious national achievement. May you have divine guidance in a calm and earnest judgment to the end that the peoples of the earth may rise up and call this nation blessed."

BERNSTORFF CANDIDATE FOR THE REICHSTAG

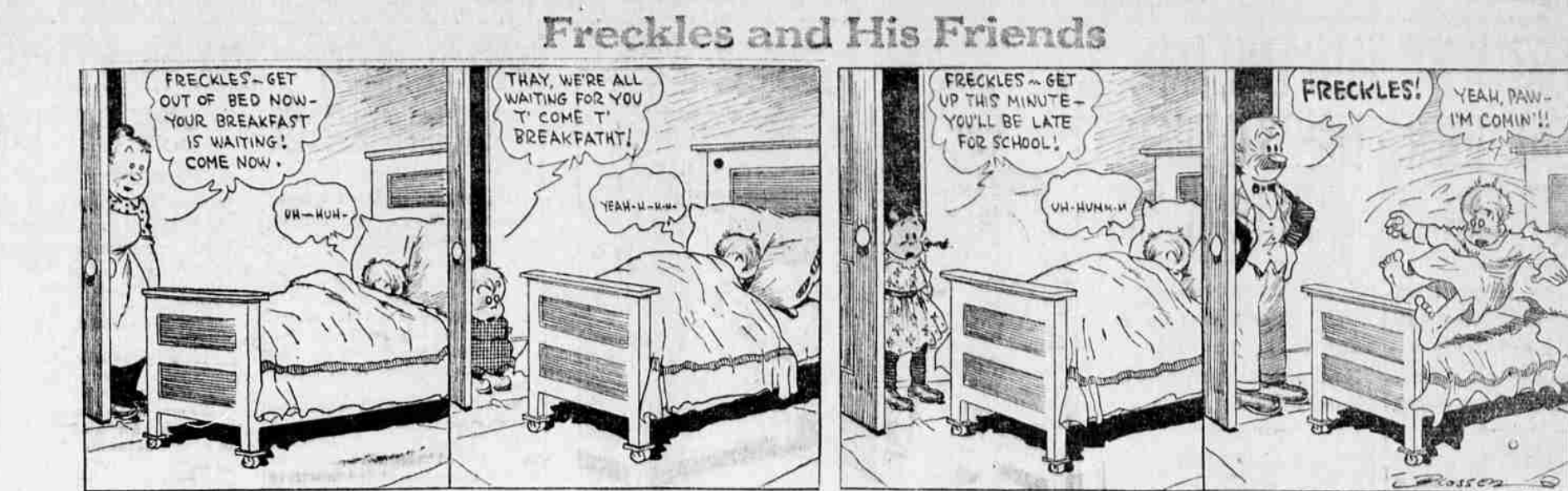
