To relieve the car shortage 200 freight empties arrived at this terminal last Friday morning from the south, to be distributed over the S. P. system throughout Oregon as urgent needs may require.

The Ohio society held its annual reunion gathering here on Saturday with the customary good attendance. There was an interesting program, including literary and musical numbers. Dr. G. W. Gregg of Ashland was elected president; W. S. Crowell of Medford, vice-president; Mrs. Cassius Miller and W. B. Smith, both of Ashland, were elected secretary and treasurer, respectively. The 1918 reunion will be a joint affair, held by Ashland and Medford and surrounding towns, at Medford. Not only native sons and daughters of old Ohio are invited, but also any former residents of the Buckeye state.

The Chautauqua building committee will hold a meeting on Monday evening, February 5, at Attorney G. W. Trefron's office in Citizen Bank block. If the proposition to sell Chautauqua park to the city carries at the special election, President M. C. Reed states that building operations will begin immediately.

Edwards of the Nazarene church. Interment was in Mountain View. No relatives were present, neither has the location of any of them yet been determined. The deceased owned 200 acres of land in that locality acquired by homestead rights. He had money in the bank, and there is quite a lot of livestock on his ranch premises.

Lieutenant Byrne's assignment has been with the submarine K-8 in Hawaiian waters, with Honolulu as the naval base of operation. Father and son are on their way to the Dakotas, the latter on an indefinite leave of absence from active service. The family home is at Faulkton, though temporarily located at Pierre, the South Dakota capital.

A hired man lost his life in the flames, also seven horses. Other contents in the barn made the loss a heavy one. 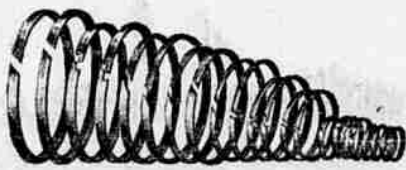
