

MAY MODIFY U-BOAT WARFARE

LONDON, March 13.—The arrival in Europe of Count Von Bernstorff, former ambassador to the United States, has caused renewed discussion in Berlin of the submarine blockade, between political, naval and diplomatic representatives, according to the Norwegian Mercantile Shipping Gazette, says Reuter's Christiania correspondent.

"Some German naval attaches in neutral countries have been called to Berlin for a conference," continues the dispatch. "The alteration but not the raising of the blockade is probable."

These conferences, it is indicated by the publication, arose out of developments during Von Bernstorff's stay in Christiania, when indirect efforts, it is said, were made to prevent the situation between Germany and America developing into war.

BERNSTORFF TO TELL ABOUT PLOT LEAK

COPENHAGEN, March 13.—Count Von Bernstorff, dismissed German ambassador to the United States, prepared a statement on Germany's dealing with Mexico after his arrival here. This statement will be forwarded to the Berlin foreign office and if approved will be made public through the Wolff bureau, the official German news agency. It is understood that the statement deals with the way in which Foreign Secretary Zimmermann's instructions to the German minister in Mexico City fell into the hands of the American government.

The departure of the Frederick VII from Christiania was decided upon so suddenly that several passengers were left behind in the Norwegian capital.

\$800,000 AVAILABLE FOR STRAHORN ROAD

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.—Robert E. Strahorn, railroad builder of Spokane, announced here today that he had approximately \$800,000 immediately available toward the construction of 400 miles of railroad which will connect up the existing lines in southern and southeast Oregon. Strahorn's project, he said, would open up undeveloped territory as large as the state of Ohio. He said nearly \$6,000,000 additional would be required to complete the building program.
