BOILER EXPLODES ON DUTCH CRUISER

LONDON, March 15.—An explosion on board the Dutch cruiser Gelderland is reported by Renter's correspondent at The Hague. The explosion, that of a boiler, occurred during the night. One man was killed and fourteen men were injured. The Gelderland, adds the correspondent, was towed to Flushing by a torpedo boat. The Gelderland, a cruiser of 3,969 tons, 311 feet long, 48 feet beam and 17 feet draft, was built at Rotterdam in 1898. Her main battery consists of two 5.9 inch guns and six 4.7 inch guns with two torpedo tubes. She made twenty knots on her trial trip. Her complement is 323 men.

TO FIX MINIMUM WAGES FOR WOMEN

SAN FRANCISCO, March 15.—The California industrial welfare commission announced today it intended to fix minimum wages for girls and women employed in retail stores throughout the state. The Retail Drygoods association has been requested by the commission to submit a list of names from which the commission may choose three representatives of employers to sit on the wage board. Three employees will be included in the list to sit on the board.

LOS ANGELES HOTEL DESTROYED BY FIRE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 15.—Fire swept the annex of the new hotel Roslyn, Fifth and Main streets here early today, causing damage estimated at from \$75,000 to \$125,000. Some 600 guests of the hotel were driven to the street scantily clad, but no one was injured. An explosion was reported to the police to have occurred in the basement. One man who leaped from a third floor window is said to be seriously injured. Fred Kelly, brother of Judge E. H. STATE WINS SUIT BROUGHT AGAINST HYDE FOR LAND

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 15.—Circuit Judge W. L. Bradshaw, The Dalles, today notified Attorney General George M. Brown he had decided in favor of the state in a suit brought to recover land in Wasco county from F. A. Hyde and associates, which the government claimed was acquired fraudulently years ago. The state was directed to reimburse Hyde \$1.25 per acre. A similar decision was rendered recently in a suit brought to recover land from Hyde in Lynn county. Five other like suits are pending. Thirty thousand acres are involved in the seven suits.

The decision of Judge Bradshaw is directly opposed to one recently rendered by Judge Campbell of Oregon City in a similar suit. Judge Campbell held that a law passed in 1913, the purpose of which was to validate certain deeds issued by the state land board covering sales of lands taken through mortgage foreclosure, was broad enough to validate all state deeds including the Benson and Hyde transactions. These contests cover about 50,000 acres of land taken from the state, through fraud. The suits were filed by the attorney general at the direction of Governor West and if the state prevails in the contests the state school fund will be enriched to the extent of \$500,000.

BOOZE SHIPPED AS SKID GREASE SEIZED

TACOMA, Wash., March 15.—More than 300 quart bottles of whiskey, packed in five barrels labeled "skid grease," were seized yesterday soon after it had been unloaded from the steamer Governor. James Wood, internal revenue officer says the shipment would have passed a thousand officers, so cleverly was it packed. The waybill showed the shipment was sent by the "Kasign Oil company," but this is reported to be a fictitious concern. The name of the real sender is in the hands of the officials, but will not be revealed. His arrest is expected at San Francisco.

TWO NEVADA CHINESE KILLED IN THEIR HOMES

LOVELOCK, Nev., March 15.—Two Chinese, Lee Chow and Gee Kal, both well to do, were killed in their homes here last night by two men of their own race, who immediately made their escape, though chased by officers. The police believe the murders are the outcome of the long troubles on the coast.

MEDFORD BOYS ENLIST IN ARMY AVIATION CORPS

The most picturesque branch of the army, the aviation section, has drawn a number of Medford youths to enlist. Some have taken their examinations, and others will take them Saturday, the group planning to leave for San Francisco where heart and nerve tests are made, on Sunday. Among those who have either definitely decided to leave or will probably do so are Tom Seantlin, Matt Williamson, Delbert Jones, Seely Hall, George Holmes, Kenneth Baker, and Merle Kellogg. All will go to the aviation section except Holmes, who goes into the quartermaster department. A recent order from the adjutant general gives recruiting officers power to recruit men from militia companies. Within the past month about 15 men out of the local company have enlisted in the regular army. Unless Company 7 is able to stage a successful recruiting campaign, according to Captain A. J. Vance, Medford is liable to lose her National Guard unit. Five towns in the state have already lost their companies. Company 7 has now less than 50 men. According to recent regulations the company is expected to have a complement of 195 men by the fifteenth of next June. At least 35 men must be enlisted to hold the company. The navy is also claiming a number of youths from this section, recruiting in that branch being slower because of the fact that for the army parental consent is not necessary for enlistment. Sergeant Fore of the army recruiting service has returned to Medford and will remain until Sunday.
