## ROCK ISLAND ASKS COURT'S PROTECTION

CHICAGO, March 17.—Jacob M. Dickinson, receiver of the Rock Island line and William J. Jackson, receiver of the Chicago and Eastern Illinois railroad, today applied to Judge George A. Carpenter in the United States district court here for protection of the respective properties and of such employees of the roads as may remain in service or shall be employed.

Judge Carpenter gave prompt assurance that this would be done to the full extent of the power of the court. United States Marshal Bradley was called into the conference. The receivers sent telegrams to the attorney general for active co-operation. The receivers planned to have all employees remaining in the service sworn in as deputy United States marshals and furnished with official badges.

## MEDFORD WINS CHAMPIONSHIP OF SOUTHERN OREGON

The Southern Oregon basketball title was cinched by Medford last night when the locals defeated Ashland in the third consecutive game by the score of 28 to 11. The local girls lost their game to the Ashland girls by the score of 11 to 8.

Except for a near fistic encounter between Olmstead of Medford and one of the Ashland guards, the game was lacking in sensational features. Almost perfect team work marked the performance of the locals.

Matters stood even at the end of the first half with Medford playing easily and keeping pace with the Ashland team which was endeavoring to get away with a lead. The Olmstead incident served to awaken the Medford quintet and in a whirlwind wind-up in the second half hoisted the score to 28 while holding the Ashland squad scoreless.

The girls' game was closely contested throughout. Ashland now has two out of three of the games played, with the edge over the local girls in the series which will end with the final game at Ashland tonight.

## BRITISH TROOPS IN SOMME CONTINUE THEIR ADVANCE

LONDON, Mar. 16.—The British troops in the Somme region of France have occupied almost all of St. Pierre-Vaast wood and 2,000 yards of German trenches north and south of the wood, according to the British official communication issued this evening.

"Our advance north of the Somme continues. We now hold nearly the whole of the St. Pierre-Vaast wood and enemy trenches for a thousand yards south and 2,000 yards north of it.

## MAID MYSTERIOUSLY SHOT IN BEDROOM OF SEATTLE MAN

SEATTLE, March 17.—Eugene P. Erenkrack, assistant manager of the Border Line Transportation company and widely known in shipping circles was arrested by the police this morning and is held at the city jail pending investigation of the shooting to death early this morning of Miss Mabel Howe, aged nineteen, maid at the Erenkrack home.

Erenkrack telephoned to the police this morning that Miss Howe had committed suicide in his bed room last night, using his pistol, because he had repossessed her for misconduct with another man. According to the story told to the police by Erenkrack there had been a party at the house last night, in the absence of Mrs. Erenkrack, who is visiting in California. Erenkrack says he caught Miss Howe, during the party, in the embrace of a young man, a guest of the party, and after the party Erenkrack delivered a moral lecture to the girl. Erenkrack says the girl retorted that her conduct with the young man guest was no worse than Erenkrack's own with a young woman guest, and became greatly excited, finally drawing out his loaded revolver from between the mattresses of his bed. She then shot and killed herself, he said. The police say a bump on the girl's head had not been explained.
