PRESIDENT VISITS WAR AND NAVY OFFICES

WASHINGTON, March 19.—President Wilson made another personal visit to the state, war and navy buildings this afternoon and there were outward indications that some new definite action was impending as the result of the latest destruction of American ships by German submarines. President Wilson conferred with Secretary Daniels, it was understood, about the issue of \$150,000 in bonds for hurrying naval construction because of national emergency.

VILLA RUSE AT ROSARIO; CAUGHT MURGUIA OFF JOB

EL PASO, Texas, March 19.—The Carranza troops, defeated at Parral, were led by a subordinate in the absence of General Murguia, who was in Chihuahua City. They came into contact with Villa's main band at Stallforth, about ten miles north of Rosario last Saturday. Villa pretended defeat and retreated to Rosario. The government troops followed and encamped that night a few miles above the town. Led into a false sense of security by Villa's feigned defeat, the government soldiers were lying around their camp Sunday morning when they were caught completely off their guard by a surprise attack. The men on foot were practically all killed, wounded or captured. The cavalry, however, managed to escape. It was said the entire number of survivors did not exceed 800 out of the 1000 engaged.

LISTER SIGNS FISH CODE AND CONDENSED MILK BILL

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 19.—Governor Lister today signed the fish code, the condensed milk bill and the bill permitting consolidation of rival street car systems, passed by the late session of the legislature. The governor permitted the capitol building bill to become a law without his signature.

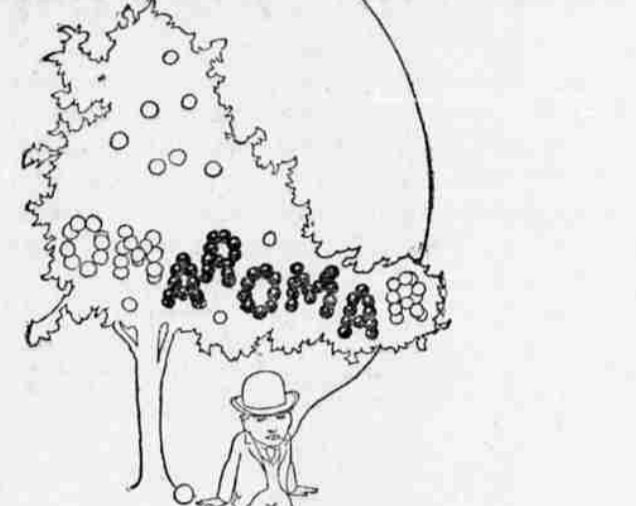

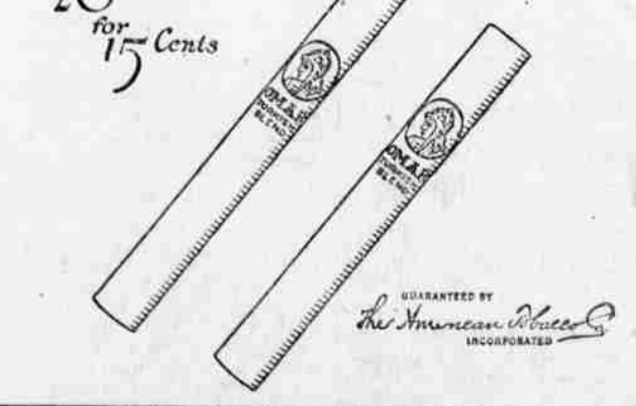

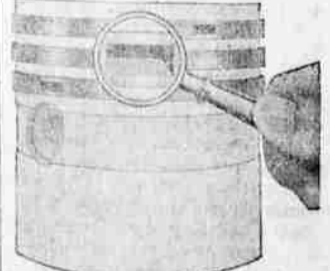
