RICH STRIKES IN BLUE LEDGE SHOW MOUNTAIN OF ORE

Even the Blue Ledge people are just beginning to realize what they actually possess in the way of an immensely rich mining property. Recent operations, on a small scale, have uncovered tremendous bodies of ore in practically all of the tunnels and drifts. All of the ore that is being trimmed to the dump at this time is worth more than \$100 a ton in copper and gold. Considering the quantity and value of the discovery, it is the most gigantic find of that character ever made on the continent.
 There are now 550 tons of the new ore on the dump. It is being extracted at the rate of 50 tons—\$5000 worth—each day. Two eight-hour shifts are being worked. They fill the tram to capacity every hour of the two shifts. That output, if continued for a year uninterruptedly, would aggregate \$1,825,000 worth of ore—nearly three times the price asked by the present owners of the property.
Every Tunnel and Drift a Surprise
 The miners in the Blue Ledge tunnels are only beginning to reach the vast bodies of rich ore that lies concealed under the crest of the Siskiyou. In drift No. 10, in tunnel 1, the face of the ledge of high-grade ore has increased to nine feet in width and is looking better every inch of the way. There is no way to determine the extent of the ledge, otherwise, except as they are broken down. That the ore assays better than 25 per cent is known. It is known also that it runs about \$30 per ton in gold. In raise 10 of the same tunnel, where the rich ore was originally found, the eight-foot face is being maintained and the grade appears to increase as depth is reached.
 All the drifts, except one, is improving in output as the work progresses. The one exception is the west drift in tunnel No. 1, which yields 42 per cent zinc. The vein is six feet wide. It is not being worked. Zinc is worth about 10 cents a pound. Copper is worth 37 cents.
Unusually Clean Output
 The ore bodies are so large and pure that little or no waste is being handled. One can find scarcely a hatful of unproductive material in a ton of the ore.
 Exposures from day to day are little less than sensational. What Judge Barch said about that mine, after only a casual inspection, is now being actually demonstrated to be true.
 And the Blue Ledge mine is only a small portion of that vast mountain of rich ore. All of the claims in that vicinity, sufficiently worked to expose geological and mineralogical data at some depth, passed through the same introductory conditions as those through which the Blue Ledge passed at their stages of development. The Selby, the Bloodfield, the Copper King, the Cook and Green and other nearby properties are in the same great body of copper ore, with fine values in gold. Further development will, as the miners read the formation, show them to be great in equal measure with the Blue Ledge mine.

SWISS FORM OF GOVERNMENT IS LIKELY FOR RUSSIA

PETROGRAD, March 20.—Russia's government, it was learned at the foreign office today, will rest exclusively in the control of the council of ministers until the convocation of the constitutional assembly. The duma committee having fulfilled its task as the temporary governing body during the days of the revolution, will thus pass out of existence as the chief executive body of the nation and will surrender its extraordinary powers to a cabinet whose premier, Prince Lvoff, will have the authority approximating that of the president of a republic.
 It is impossible as yet to forecast with any certainty the final form the government will assume since it will depend entirely upon the collective will of the entire people to which has been extended the proclamation of the new government regarding universal suffrage.
 The belief prevails in official circles that the opinion of the country will be found to favor a republican form of government not under a president, but under a commission similar to the governing body of Switzerland.
 In event the old regime is dead, the foreign office today informed the Associated Press and nothing can resurrect it. If the people decided upon a monarchy it will be a monarchy of the most limited type and the monarch will be stripped of all the traditional powers which belonged to the emperor and he will be little more than a ruler in name only.

ASHLAND VOTES \$15,000 BONDS FOR CHAUTAUQUA PARK

ASHLAND, Ore., March 20.—At the special City election yesterday, the proposition empowering the mayor and common council of Ashland to issue \$15,000 in bonds to purchase Chautauqua park, carried by more than two to one, the vote being 725 for and 337 against.
 The re-assessment measure also carried by a vote of 579 for to 370 against.
 The proposition to levy a half mill tax for publicity and park purposes carried by 510 to 434.
 The straw referendum to repeal two city ordinances was also defeated. The first related to minors frequenting pool and billiard halls. The existing ordinance barring such minors was upheld by a vote of 606 to 445, the closest vote on the several measures submitted. The second related to closing billiard halls on Sunday, the lid feature being retained by a vote of 633 to 416.
 The initial three measures carried in every ward, except the first, which gave a majority of nine against the half-mill levy. The three wards severally also gave majorities against minors frequenting billiard resorts and in favor of the Sunday closing law. Total vote cast 1062.

SUGAR COMPANY CLOSES CAMPAIGN

The Utah-Idaho Sugar Co. has practically closed its campaign for acreage for sugar beet growing in this section for the season, according to J. B. Pettinelli, field superintendent. Fourteen hundred acres have been secured in the vicinity of Medford with one hundred more to sign this week.
 With the opening of a campaign for acreage by the company in the vicinity of Independence, in the Willamette valley, the company is assured of over 3500 acres for this season's run.
 Machinery and seed for the spring planting is on the ground and Mr. Pettinelli expects to start seeding operations next week. The late season has held back seeding but it is believed that the delay will be advantageous to the crop.
