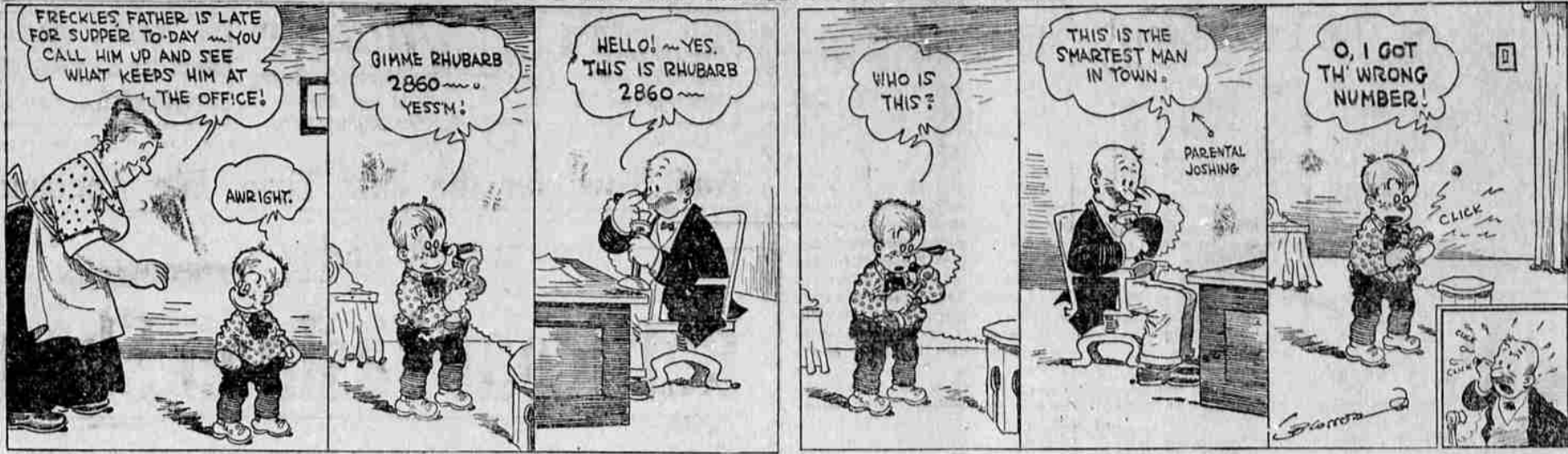

ORDINANCE NO. 877. AN ORDINANCE providing for the acceptance of water certificates in payment of water rent and for the issuance of water certificates on payment of water assessments and the acceptance of said water certificates in payment of water rent. WHEREAS, the city council of the City of Medford passed a resolution on April 27th, 1909, declaring the intention of the City of Medford to issue to each property owner, who pays any assessment on account of any water main, a certificate to be received in payment for water rent on said premises covered by said certificate; and WHEREAS, in pursuance to said resolution the City of Medford has heretofore issued certain water certificates;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF MEDFORD DOETH ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: Section 1. That the city treasurer of Medford, Oregon, is hereby instructed to issue to each property owner, who pays any assessment prior to May 31, 1917, on account of any water main, heretofore laid, a certificate therefor describing the premises for which the payment is made and in the amount of the principal only. Section 2. Said city treasurer is hereby directed to receive water certificates heretofore or hereafter issued by said city in payment of water at any time thereafter upon said premises covered by said certificate. Section 3. No certificate shall be issued to anyone who may pay any assessment on account of any water main after May 31st, 1917. Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances and all resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. Section 5. Inasmuch as the reorganization of the water department of said City of Medford is now taking place and the duties of the city recorder in reference to the water department are to be performed by the city treasurer and it is for that reason necessary for the peace, health and safety of said City of Medford, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage by the city council and approval by the mayor. The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council of the City of Medford on the 22nd day of March, 1917, by the following vote: Emmons, 'aye'; Gaddis, 'aye'; Keene, 'aye'; Carlin, 'aye'; Davis, 'no'; Hargrave, 'aye.'
