WAR WILL STOP WESTERN ATHLETICS SAY MANAGERS

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., March 27.—E. C. Behrens, graduate manager of athletics at Stanford, telegraphed Graduate Managers Arthur Younger of the University of Washington today recommending cancellation of Pacific coast conference athletic schedules and intercollegiate athletic activities of all kinds if war is declared and a general mobilization ordered.

Behrens said while his recommendation to Younger was purely personal and in response to a similar suggestion from Younger, President Wilber of Stanford and members of the executive committee of the associated students had recommended the idea. The executive committee will meet tonight and will probably act on the recommendation.
