The pupils presented in song recital by Mrs. May Jordan Mac Donough at the Methodist church, Wednesday evening, were greeted by an audience that completely filled the auditorium.

Previous to the beginning of the program, Mrs. Mac Donough, in a brief talk, outlined the work accomplished by the pupils in the short time they have been under her instruction.

The soprano, Mrs. Gladys Hall, is the possessor of a voice that, for beauty of tone and quality, has no superior in Medford, and that, with increasing maturity and experience, should win her a place among the best singers of the country.

Miss Lillian Carstens, mezzo-contralto, bids fair to have a very fine voice. Being still in the early teens her voice has not yet attained great volume, but it of pleasing quality, smooth and of usual range for one of her age.

The basso, Mr. Dean Carder, took the audience by storm with his singing of Mendelssohn's aria, "I am a Roamer Bold," from the opera "Son and Stranger". There seems to be no limit to the range of his voice. He is equally at home on the heights or in the abyss of a "D" below the staff. There are other singers who can touch the low "E" flat, but few who can sing for an entire score at that pitch, with occasional upward leaps an octave, as Mr. Carder did in the aforementioned aria.

Mr. Albert Mac Donough, tenor robusto, has already established himself as a favorite with those who have been fortunate enough to hear him sing.

Not a small part of the success of the evening was due to the satisfying accompaniments of Miss Mattie Vroman at the piano, while Miss Ruth Campbell's beautiful rendition of the violin obbligato in Miss Carstens' solo left nothing to desire.

The evening was one of real enjoyment and many were the compliments showered upon the singers and their teacher.
