EITHER PATRIOT OR TRAITOR.

SENATOR HARRY LANE is sending out under govern-
ment frank, numerous explanations of his attitude as
one of the "wilful" twelve who conducted the filibuster
upon the armed ship bill. He declares that he did not fil-
buster on the bill, yet encloses a copy of his revised speech
in which he presents his flabby filibuster. He declares he
was willing to vote upon the armed ship bill—that is to
vote against it.

Senator Lane opposed the breaking of diplomatic rela-
tions with Germany. He opposed the armed neutrality bill
—and his reception of the president's speech asking a de-
claration of a state of war, indicates a vote against the pend-
ing resolution. Protesting his love for democracy, he fa-
vors a surrender of the rights of democracy to aggressive
autocracy. Prating of peace, he would aid in the perpetu-
ation of the tyranny that is waging war on the world.

Senator Lane concludes his sob for sympathy as fol-
lows:

"I spoke also for those who profit not and hate not, and of our own
hungry people, our women and children who are now going without suf-
ficient clothing and those others across the waters, our ancestors, whose
women and children starve and die and whose misery is not to be matched
outside of hell, and awoke the next morning to learn that I was being de-
nounced by some for having kept my pledge to the people of Oregon that
I would not willingly permit their rights to be invaded."

This sounds like the German press speaking of the holy
German cause of destroying civilization and enslaving hu-
manity. For the sake of our own hungry people, we should
permit the Kaiser to go on destroying American ships, tor-
pedoing Belgian relief ships and slaughtering American
citizens, so that when the hour strikes, Prussian mili-
tarism can smite unprepared America and spread the
misery of hell from Europe to America.

The kept hyphenated press has applauded Senator
Lane for favoring Germany in the quarrel with the United
States. "Well done, thou good and faithful servant,"
shouts the New York organ of the kaiser, under Lane's pic-
ture as a reward for his armed ship filibuster. Mr. Lane,
indeed, deserves an iron cross for carrying out the kaiser's
policy in America. He is evidently Oregon's "blond sur-
vivor"—Nitsche's superman—"destined to rule over man-
kind."

Lane's peace propaganda is necessarily a pro-German
propaganda, and in the interest of Germany and against
the interest of the United States because Germany is al-
ready and has been for some time, waging war upon the
United States. Lane's advocacy of non-resistance is for
the benefit of German militarism in its struggle to de-
stroy democracy. His demands, though smeared with
slush, are in effect that the United States surrender its
rights, honor and sovereignty to permit Prussian autocr-
acy to dictate the laws of nations.

Pacificist agitation at this time, only embarrasses the
president and comforts Germany. It aids Berlin and
cripples Washington. It strengthens German conspiracy
and weakens American defense. It cannot serve any other
end, it cannot avert war because Germany is already wag-
ing war upon us, and we have war whether we want it or
not. Senator Lane's peace palavar then can only help the
enemy and hamper the president, and is therefore akin to
treason against the republic.

Senator Harry Lane is either for the United States, or
he is for Germany. There are no ifs and ands about it.
He is either patriot or traitor, and his vote will tell the
story.

BRAND WHITLOCK
AND RELIEF WORKERS
ARRIVE AT BERNE

BERNE, April 4.—Brand Whitlock,
American minister to Belgium,
reached Berne at 6 o'clock this evening
looking worn and weary. He ad-
mitted feeling extremely nervous and
fatigued after the tremendous strain
under which he has been working,
which has been especially hard dur-
ing the last few weeks. Mr. Whit-
lock was accompanied from Zurich to
Berne by Pleasant A. Stoyan, Ameri-
can minister to Switzerland, who,
with the legation attaches went part
of the way to the frontier with him.

The Swiss government sent three
high officers to Schaffhausen to meet
the Americans to accompany them to
Zurich. From Brussels to the frontier
the Whitlock party was escorted
by Baron Von Falkenhausen, an of-
ficial especially designated by Gov-
ernor Von Bismarck. The party left
Brussels on Monday night on a special
train.

In addition to sixty Americans
comprising the legation staff, consuls
and all but five of the Belgian
relief commission officials, Mr. Whit-
lock traveled with the Chinese staff
and their families. The Chinese of-
ficials had received instructions to
leave Brussels for Harve at almost
the same time as the Americans.

Mr. Whitlock described his depart-
ure from Brussels as extremely
touching. The Belgians, who since
the breach of relations between the
United States and Germany have been
pathetically anxious lest the depart-
ure of the Americans might mean
starvation for them, gathered by the

SPRING THAW TO
EFFECTUALLY CHECK
RIGA OFFENSIVE

COPENHAGEN, April 4.—A "per-
sonage particularly well informed po-
litically and militarily," who is easily
recognizable as Colonel Von Haeften
of the general staff in charge of the
military department of the foreign
office, has informed the Politiken
that there is no prospect of a German
offensive on the Riga front. The col-
onel says:

"The spring thaw that is now set-
ting in is enough in itself to deprive
an offensive of any chance of success.
Even if the Germans succeeded in tak-
ing the Russian positions it would be
impossible for them to move artillery
and supplies forward for an advance
on Petrograd. They would be hope-
lessly bogged."

Colonel Von Haeften also doubts
whether Field Marshal Von Hinden-
burg contemplates an offensive on
the Sereth front in Rumania but
thinks he will adopt a defensive atti-
tude on the east front generally.

The Politiken continues:
"The statements of the German
general staff, which have certain in-
herent probabilities are another ex-
ample of the German determination
to quiet Russian apprehension in ev-
ery possible way. The belief is cher-
ished that the Russians if left to
themselves will inevitably continue to
quarrel over internal questions,
whereas the menace of a strong Ger-
man offensive would weld all Russian
parties together in defense of their
national existence."

FIRST OF SERIES
OF SPUD MEETINGS
HELD AT ASHLAND

The first of a series of "spud"
meetings in Jackson county was held
last night at the Valley View school
house in Ashland section. The inter-
est in potatoes manifest at this meet-
ing was very encouraging to the
speaker, C. J. Hurd, state orange or-
ganizer of Eugene, was present and
found a receptive mood among the
farmers on the subject of farm orga-
nization.

Prof. Larsen emphasized the need
of better seed potatoes and discussed
fully methods of producing this stock.
He urged seed treatment against dis-
ease, favoring the corrosive sublimate
solution over formalin. Corrosive
sublimate is recommended for scab
and Rhizoctonia both.

"The majority of diseases spread
in the seed are brought into practical
control by seed selection and seed
treatment. The Rogue river valley
should become an exporter of pota-
toes instead of an importing center.
The free working soils of this section
should produce profitable crops of po-
tatoes and in many cases in the or-
chards at little additional cost of the
grower. Clean seed, crop rotation,
and up to date cultural practices will
insure the potato crop."

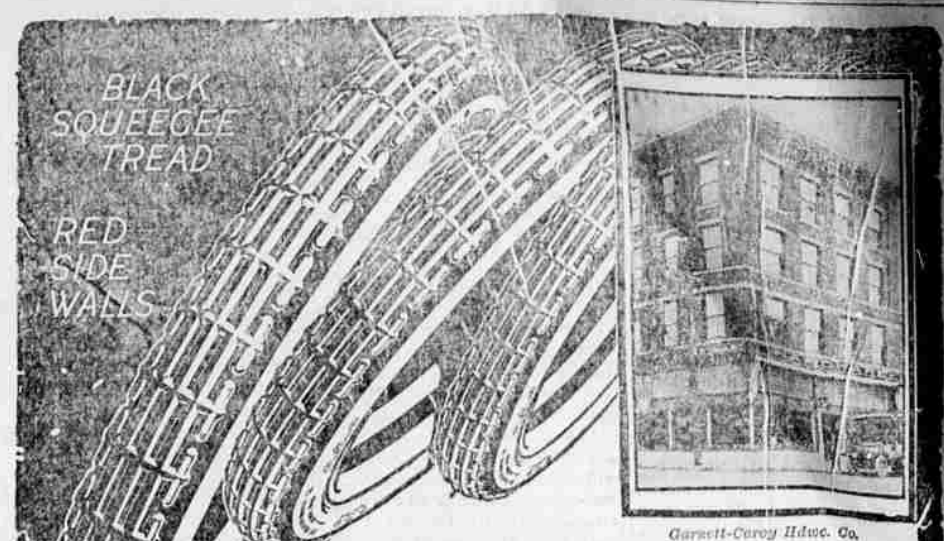

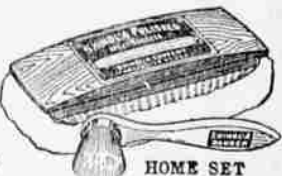
