

BITTER SPEECHES BY WILFUL FEW OPPOSING WAR

that he would vote against the resolution.

Wall street interests, Senator Norris asserted, are interested in profiting from the United States entering the war. He also declared a large number of newspapers and news agencies have been controlled and enlisted in the greatest propaganda that the world has ever known to manufacture sentiment for war.

Dollar Upon Flag.

"We are going into war upon command of gold," Norris continued. "We are about to do the bidding of the dollar, the bidding of the dollar's terrible mandate, make millions of our countrymen suffer, ungodly generations bear burdens and shed their life blood and all because we want to preserve our commercial rights to deliver munitions to the belligerents. I feel we are about to put a dollar sign on the American flag." Senator Reed, democrat of Missouri, replied to Senator Norris by declaring that his charge that the war resolution was placing the dollar sign on the American flag was "almost reason."

His assertion that the nation was going to war on the demand of gold was "an indictment of the president of the United States, an indictment of congress, of the American people and of the truth."

Senator Norris, Reed declared, was a man so blinded by his obsessions "that all that is necessary to get him to take a false vision is to suggest that some wealthy man or interest, however remote or contingent, is concerned in something, or will make profits from something."

"The president is not calling America to arms for the sake of a few salty dollars," Senator Reed continued, "but for the life, honor and integrity of this country—to say that neutral nations shall not be crushed under the iron heel of that military despotism that threatens the life and civilization of free countries, and, in fact, the world."

Sensors James, Williams and Tomerone joined in a sharp tilt with the Nebraska senator at which spectators laughed and applauded. Some issued statements by Senator Norris and were warned against demonstrations.

When Senator Reed said the Nebraska senator owed it to the country to make clear his "dollar mark" statement, Senator Norris replied he could not help wrong constructions being placed upon his words and disclaimed any reflection upon the president or congress.

La Follette Speaks.

Senator La Follette began to speak in the war resolution in the senate this afternoon.

Senator La Follette declared the sentiment of the poor against war would make itself heard, "and I hope at a peaceful and orderly way before long, when if we take this step prices of necessities will multiply and they will come to be taxed double again and again. If a vote were taken among the American people it would show ten to one against war."

Marion Centers of Medford was up on Anderson creek Tuesday.

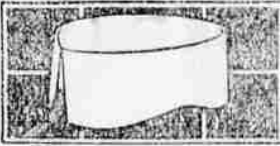
