

HOUSE PASSES DECLARATION OF WAR 373 TO 50

President Approves War Resolution Adopted by Both Branches of Congress—32 Republicans, 16 Democrats, One Socialist and One Prohi Vote Against War Measure.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—War between the United States and Germany becomes an actuality today immediately upon President Wilson's approval of the war resolution adopted by a vote of 373 to 50 by the house a few minutes after 3 o'clock this morning. This action will set in motion the government's newly planned machinery for mustering military, naval and economic forces into an aggressive war against Germany.

Same as Senate Bill. The resolution passed the house in the same form as adopted by the senate Wednesday night. It declares that a state of war exists and directs the president to employ all the naval and military forces of the United States and resources of the government to carry on war to a successful conclusion. Among the fifty who voted against war were thirty-two republicans, sixteen democrats, one socialist and one prohibitionist. Voting affirmative were 193 democrats, 177 republicans, two progressives and one independent.

Democratic Leader Kitchin and Miss Jeannette Rankin, the new woman member from Montana, were two of those who voted negatively. After failing to answer to the calling of her name twice on the first roll call, Miss Rankin rose on the second roll call, trembling, obviously badly frightened, and with a sob in her voice, declared:

"I want to stand by my country, but I cannot vote for war."

Miss Rankin Votes No. Still she did not formally cast her vote and half a dozen of her colleagues, weary by the protracted debate, demanded "Vote! vote!" in raucous voices, sinking into her seat Miss Rankin whispered, "no." Jerry South, chief clerk, went to her seat to corroborate her vote.

A majority of those who opposed the resolution, including Mr. Kitchin, announced that once it was passed they would support it without reservation. The house will not meet again until Monday noon.

MEDFORDITES TO BE CALLED TO THE COLORS SOON

WASHINGTON, Apr. 6.—The navy department completed preparations late today to flash telegraphic orders for the mobilization of 15,000 members of the naval militia and the naval reserves immediately upon the signing of the war resolution by President Wilson after it has passed the house.

The Atlantic fleet has been maintained on a war basis since the national emergency was declared. The 10,000 members of the naval militia and the 5,000 men in the various classes of the naval reserve will be employed immediately to fill up the complement of reserve ships and auxiliary and put in commission the first of the huge motor boat patrol fleets for coast protection against submarines.

GERMAN SHIPS AT NORTHWEST PORTS SEIZED

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—Federal authorities seized three German vessels here today and interned their crews at the United States immigration station on Angel Island.

SEATTLE, Wn., April 6.—The Hamburg-American liner Saxonia and the German sailing ship Steinbock, interned at Eagle Harbor, near Seattle, were seized by deputy United States marshals at 1 o'clock this morning. The crews were brought to the immigration station in Seattle in a launch, and are confined in comfortable quarters there.

PORTLAND, Or., April 6.—Customs officers, assisted by soldiers, early today seized three German sailing vessels, the Kurt, Dalbek and Arnoldus Winnen, which have been in refuge along the Columbia and Willamette rivers between here and Astoria since the outbreak of the war. The crews were removed to places of confinement and guards left in charge.

HOUSE PASSES WAR RESOLUTION 373 TO 50

WASHINGTON, Apr. 6.—The resolution declaring that a state of war exists between the United States and Germany, already passed by the senate, passed the house shortly after 3 o'clock this morning by a vote of 373 to 50. President Wilson will sign the resolution as soon as Vice-President

Marshall has attached his signature to the senate. It formally accepts the state of belligerency forced by German aggressions and authorizes and directs the president to employ the military and naval forces and all the resources of the nation to bring war against Germany to a successful termination.

Without roll calls the house rejected all amendments, including proposals to prohibit the sending of any troops overseas without congressional authority.

Passage of the resolution followed seventeen hours of debate. There was no attempt to filibuster, but the pacifist group, under the leadership of Democratic Leader Kitchin, prolonged the discussion with impassioned speeches declaring conscience would not permit him to support the president's recommendation that a state of war be declared.

Cheers greeted the announcement of the result. A few minutes later Speaker Clark signed the resolution and the house then adjourned, to meet again Monday and take up the administration recommendations for war legislation.

RESERVE CORPS OFFERS FIELD FOR TRAINED OFFICERS

Efforts are being made by the government to build up the officers' reserve corps provided in the national defense act passed by congress last June to secure a reserve of officers available for temporary duty.

In time of peace members of the officers' reserve may be called upon to duty with troops or in field exercises for not to exceed 15 days each year, or with the consent of the officers to a longer period.

In time of actual or threatened hostilities, as at present, officers of the reserve are subject to temporary duty with the regular army, volunteers or other authorized organizations.

Men possessing the necessary qualifications, particularly those who have had previous military training or who possess special educational attainments, are being sought to present applications for appointment to the officers' reserve corps. Young men are wanted especially for lieutenants in the line.

Explaining the officers' reserve corps in a bulletin recently issued by the western department of the army, with headquarters at San Francisco,

Appointment to the officers' reserve corps are made by the president following prescribed examinations.

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and must be at least 21 years of age. None will be appointed to rank or second lieutenant who has passed the age of 32; to be first lieutenant who is past 36; to be captain who is past 40; or to be major who is past 45.

These age limits do not apply, however to appointments of officers of the quartermaster, engineer, ordnance, signal, judge advocate, and medical sections of the reserve corps. "The war department today has special need for line officers in the grade of first and second lieutenants for infantry, cavalry, field artillery and coast artillery," reads the western department's circular.

Those desiring appointments in line sections should apply to the "Officer in Charge, Officers' Reserve Corps,

Headquarters Western Department, San Francisco."

For those desiring appointment to ranks below captain, application can also be made to Captain W. P. Currier, Vancouver Barracks, Wash.

Those desiring appointments to other than line sections must apply to the head of the staff corps or department concerned, care the war department at Washington, D. C.

Enlisted men of the regular army and of the national guard, both active and retired, if citizens, are eligible to examination for the reserve corps, subject to the prescribed age limitations.

Commissions are for five years. When an officer reaches the age limit for his rank, however, he is honorably discharged unless re-commissioned in a higher rank.

T. R. RESENTS WILSON SNUB OF DIVISION TROOP PLAN

"The American people," asserted Colonel Roosevelt, "are united behind the president in the determination to wage effective and aggressive war for our rights and for the rights of humanity, and civilization."

"I believe the American people desire that in the immediate future we send abroad an expeditionary force."
