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CALL ISSUED FOR 500,000 VOLUNTEERS TO FILL UP ARMY

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The war department prepared today to issue instructions to recruiting officers which would be in effect a call for 500,000 volunteers to fill up the regular army and the existing units of the National Guard. All recruits enlisted since the declaration of war and those to be enlisted hereafter will be notified that they will be discharged at the close of the war, putting them in the status of war time volunteers. A total of 4355 men already have been enrolled in the regular army who will come under such status. This number of recruits was accepted during the first ten days after the passage of the war resolution.

Analysis of the pending administration bill as it affects the regular army and the National Guard shows that provision is made for the absorption of 517,868 volunteers. Of these 151,519 will be needed to fill up the regular army and 266,349 for the National Guard. As 15,000 men must be withdrawn from these two services within six months to train the first 500,000 increment of the selective conscript army, their places must be taken by that number of additional volunteers. By this plan, while absorbing the volunteer spirit of the country, the feasibility of depending entirely upon volunteers will be demonstrated. Army officers are certain that it will show congress where there are some doubts of the selective conscription plan, that conscription is necessary to maintain an army adequate to meet the present situation.

BRAZIL SEVERS GERMAN RELATIONS

RIO JANEIRO, April 12.—It is believed here that the government will confine itself for the present to the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany and that a declaration of war will not be issued, at least in the immediate future. A decision as to seizing the German ships in Brazilian harbors has been postponed. The German minister was given his passports at Petropolis last night.

SCHUMANN-HEINK SINGS 'STAR SPANGLED BANNER'

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 12.—With tears streaming down her cheeks, Mme. Ernestine Schumann-Heink sang the "Star Spangled Banner" in a never-to-be-forgotten way to a crowd in the Grant hotel Tuesday night when she returned to her home here from Chicago. The band of the Twenty-first infantry, of which regiment the diva is honorary president, serenaded her on her arrival. In the Grant lobby the band struck up the national anthem. There was a pause and then Schumann-Heink's voice took up the strain. High above the band her voice sounded and men in the street stopped and stood bare-headed until she had finished, sobbing. "Oh, it is terrible," she cried, "I have four sons and a son-in-law ready and waiting to fight for America, while across the water another son fights in the German navy."

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 12.—President Wilson in an interview in the Yale News today pays a tribute to the spirit of American colleges in the present national emergency. He says: "The patriotic spirit of the American college man of today has never been surpassed in any other age. (Continued from Page One.) last night on the new front below St. Quentin between Coney and Quincy-Basse, the French drove back the Germans to the southwestern edge of the upper Coney forest, capturing several important positions, the war office announces. In the Champagne the Germans were ejected from trenches east of Saigneul.


The statement follows: "Between the Somme and the Oise artillery fighting continued with violence during the night, especially in the region of Urville. "South of the Oise our troops after artillery preparation, attacked the German positions east of the line from Coney La Ville to Quincy-Basse. After a spirited engagement we forced back the enemy as far as the southwestern end of the upper Coney forest. Several important points of support fell into our hands notwithstanding the resistance of the enemy, who left a number of dead on the ground and prisoners in our hands."

Similar advices regarding Bulgaria are sent by the Exchange Telegraph representatives at Lausanne. He reports that the Gazette of that city states it has learned that semi-official Bulgarian delegates are in Switzerland endeavoring to arrive at a basis for a separate peace with representatives of the entente.

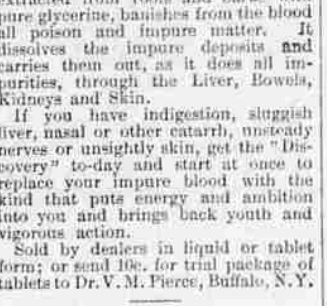
