The vain hope that Germany in a few months might see occurrences similar to those in Russia might again postpone the end of the war, which now seems so near, and again cost hundreds of thousands of lives in the battlefield. Whoever has reason or conscience, therefore, will especially ask what will be the result of what is done."

RAILROAD FUNDS SPENT TO INFLUENCE POLITICAL PARTIES

VICTORIA, B. C., April 17.—During the British Columbia government's inquiry today into the construction of the Pacific Great Eastern railroad, whose bonds were guaranteed by the province, R. D. Thomas, secretary of Foley, Welch & Stewart, contractors, said he knew of two checks of \$50,000 each and one of \$15,000, which had been given to political parties for campaign purposes.
