THE HOHENZOLLERNS MUST GO

PRESIDENT WILSON has made it fairly clear that America does not consider peace possible in a world in which the Hohenzollern dynasty is allowed to rule.

The Hohenzollerns and their dynastic ambitions have been the curse not only of the docile German people, but of the whole world as well.

It began back in the eighteenth century, when Wilhelm's much-belauded ancestor, Frederick the Great, assisted in the partition of the independent kingdom of Poland, taking a liberal slice for himself.

What could the civilized nations expect of Germany in relations with little Belgium, when they remembered what Prussia had done to little Denmark back in the '60s?

He has forever stained his name with the violation of Belgium, with the destruction of its quiet, old, dreamy cities, with the exile and deportation of its people.

This fantast with brain warped by lust for power, this neurotic, this blasphemer with his wicked pratings about the favor of the God of Divine Love for his accursed family, must go, he and all his brood.

Only when they have been toppled from the high places of power and command, only when the German people are allowed to rule themselves, only when dynastic pretensions and ambitions are cast into the garbage barrel of things that were, will it be possible to have anything like peace in this world.

President Wilson's Appeal

Here are the high lights in President Wilson's appeal to the country for each man and woman to do his bit:

"We must supply abundant food for ourselves and for a large part of the nations with which we have now made common cause.

"We must supply ships by the hundreds.

"The industrial forces of the country—men and women alike, will be a great service army engaged in the service of the nation and world, the efficient friends of and saviors of free men everywhere.

"The importance of an adequate food supply especially for the present year is superlative.

"Upon the farmers of this country, in large measure, rests the fate of the war and the fate of the nations.

"I call upon young men and old alike to turn in hosts to the farms.

"I appeal to farmers of the south to plant abundant foodstuffs as well as cotton.

"To the middleman of every sort: The eyes of the country will be especially upon you. The country expects you as well as all others to forego unusual profits.

"This is the time for America to correct her unparadise fault of wastefulness and extravagance.

"These things we must do and do well, besides fighting, the things without which mere fighting would be fruitless."

PACKERS OFFER TO CUT OUT PROFITS DURING THE WAR

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Legislation to empower the council of national defense to supervise the distribution of food and if necessary fix maximum and minimum prices, was being framed today as one of the results of yesterday's conference between the great Chicago meat packers and Secretary Houston of the department of agriculture.

Headed by J. Ogden Armour, a delegation of the foremost packers, including Edwin Morris, E. A. Cudahy, Thos. E. Wilson, and L. F. Swift, assured Secretary Houston of their utmost cooperation and voluntarily proposed that the government take steps to fix prices through the council of national defense.

The licensing of food distributing agencies so the government may trace any movements of middlemen or others to monopolize supply or force raises in price is one of the features of the plan the packers proposed.

As their own "bit" in defending the nation, the packers offered a plan to distribute their products at a minimum of profit to themselves and one of them estimated the saving to the public would approximate at least \$100,000,000 a year.

Secretary Houston favors the plan and will have a part in drafting legislation to put it into effect. The power to be invested in the council of national defense, it is said, would be used only when the national interest required it.

CABINET CONSIDERS CONTROL OF PRICES

WASHINGTON, April 17.—President Wilson and the cabinet at a brief meeting today discussed legislation for the control of prices of food and other commodities, went over plans

for the reception of the British and French commissions and listened to a report from Secretary Daniels on steps taken to protect the American coast from German submarines.

Afterward it was said that the administration still stood steadfast for the selective draft army bill, in spite of opposition that has developed in the senate and house. The floating of government bonds as soon as the senate acts on the bond bill also was taken up and Secretary McAdoo said he would confer soon with financial experts to arrange the details of the issues.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 17.—A description of the scenes attending the attack by a German submarine on the Nova Scotia barkentine Ellen James was given today by Herman Hansen, the only surviving member of her crew who was brought here yesterday by the steamer which rescued him.

Hansen managed to right the boat and climb into it. Without food or water he kept afloat for twenty hours. When a steamer came in sight he had barely strength to signal her.

NORTHWEST HAS 15,000,000 BUSHEL OF WHEAT

PORTLAND, April 17.—Beginning immediately and continuing for at least two months, 100 carloads of wheat will be shipped daily from the Pacific northwest to the Atlantic seaboard for export to Europe. Arrangements have been made by the railroads at the request of the government to furnish the cars and give the business the utmost dispatch.

LAREDO, Tex., April 17.—Forty constitutionalist soldiers, several passengers and members of the train crew were killed by bandits April 9 when a southbound passenger train on the National lines was wrecked by the removal of a rail at San Miguel, twenty miles north of Gonzales Junction.
