ple for a volunteer system first of all, applying both as to filling up the ranks of the regular army, the national guard and the raising of the new army.

But when the volunteer system fails to provide sufficient numbers of men the president would have au-

thority to resort at once to selective conscription.

Following is the committee line-up on the vote for the volunteer system: For the volunteer amendments—Dent, Alabama; Fields, Kentucky; Quinn, Mississippi; Gordon, Ohio; Shallenberger, Nebraska; Caldwell, New York; Wise, Georgia; Nichols, South Carolina, and Garrett, Texas, democrats; Anthony, Kansas; Morin, Pennsylvania; Hull, Iowa, and Davidson, Wisconsin, republicans.

Against volunteer amendments and for conscription—Olney, Massachusetts; Harrison, Virginia, and Lamm, New York, democrats; Kuhn, California; McKenzie, Illinois; Greene, Vermont; Tison, Connecticut, and Crago, Pennsylvania, republicans.

The committee voted to make the military age under the bill 21 to 40, and to have it one class, instead of a division into groups of ages.
