FRENCH SUCCESS ON GREAT SCALE IN THE CHAMPAGNE

PARIS, April 18.—The official statement today follows: "South and southwest of St. Quentin there was very active artillery fighting. Patrol encounters occurred on the outskirts of the upper forest of Copoy. We took prisoners."

"Between the Aisne and the Chemin-Des-Dames we continued to make progress. An enemy attack in the region of Courtenoy was checked by our machine guns. Further east the Germans at Poir, made a violent attack on our positions at Valenciennes plateau. This futile attack was beaten back with very heavy losses and the Germans were not able to reach our lines."

"During the night there was heavy artillery fighting in the sectors of Saignes, Le Godat and La Poupelle."

"In the Champagne our successes on a great scale were continued. At Moronvilliers we attacked, achieving success everywhere. We carried Le Monthaut and several heights to the east of that point, including Hill 227. In the region south of Moronvilliers, in the course of an engagement last night we captured two more German batteries. On the front between Soissons and Auberville we have identified twelve new German divisions."

"In the region of St. Mihiel a German attack on Romilly farm was broken up. The enemy left prisoners in our hands."

D. A. R. BALLOTS FOR NATIONAL OFFICERS

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Daughters of the American Revolution resumed balloting on national officers which was interrupted by adjournment of the convention shortly before last night.

Excitement among the delegates increased as friends of the four candidates for president-general and the four tickets of aspirants for minor positions made last minute canvasses for support. The result may not be known before tomorrow.

A number of delegates planned to go to the capital today to ask their representatives and senators to support the administration's war army bill.

BUTTE WOMAN KILLS BRUTAL HUSBAND

BUTTE, Mont., April 19.—Following a beating which left her body a mass of black and blue bruises, Mrs. Laura Danvers shot and killed her husband, Art Danvers, a local oyster cocktail vendor, at the family home this morning. Danvers was climbing the stairs, apparently with a view of renewing his attack of earlier in the day, when his wife stopped him on the first landing with a bullet which severed the sub-clavian artery and penetrated the heart. Danvers' aged mother and four children were in an adjoining room when the shooting occurred. Mrs. Danvers is detained pending a coroner's inquest.

SPANISH CABINET RESIGNS BECAUSE OF WAR TROUBLES

MADRID, April 18.—The Spanish cabinet has resigned.

The food shortage, labor outbreaks, and the circulation of what was characterized by the government as a "seditious appeal to the people led to the suspension of constitutional guarantees in Spain on March 19."

Meanwhile, the ministry of Premier Romanones had other complications to cope with in the situation caused by the entry of the United States into the war. That some of the Latin-American republics would take similar action was a probability. The torpedoing of the Spanish steamer San Fulgencio, which was followed by a strong protest to Germany rendered the situation still more latense.

A government statement on April 16 declared that Spain could not abandon neutrality without the consent of the cortes and the crown and that the cabinet then in power supplied the firmest guarantee of neutrality. Since then the staying of another Spanish steamer, the Tom, has added to the gravity of the conditions.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 19.—Members of the Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco were formally authorized today to receive subscriptions for 2 1/2 per cent treasury certificates for \$200,000,000, which have been offered for sale by Secretary McAdoo through the federal reserve board. According to a telegram to John Perrin, chairman of the San Francisco Federal Reserve bank the certificates plus accrued interest can be used to purchase government war bonds if payment on the latter is called for prior to July 1, when the certificates fall due.

Payment for certificates is to be made in New York Monday or effected through the federal reserve gold settlement fund.

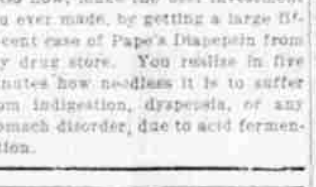

MYSTERY VEILS FATAL STABBING SEATTLE BROKER

SEATTLE, Wa., April 19.—A. Rehfeld, a diamond broker, with offices on the 14th floor of the Joshua Green building at Fourth avenue and Third Street, was fatally stabbed in his office this afternoon. Before he died he said that K. L. Bailey had attacked him. The identity of Bailey has not been learned.

Tenants of the Joshua Green building say that Rehfeld's slayer had been calling at the office almost daily for the past week or so. A memorandum penciled on one of Rehfeld's business cards indicated that just before the stabbing he had given a receipt for \$50 to Bailey on account of a diamond ring. No one saw Bailey leave the office. In his hurry he left behind him a soft green felt hat and a new overcoat. The side of the garments prove that the murderer is a small man, the police say. It is said to be certain he did not use either the elevators or the stairway. None of the several persons in adjoining offices heard old words or any scuffle preceding a loud crash of breaking glass when Rehfeld and his assailant fell against the door at the moment of the stabbing.

Rushing into the corridor, the other tenants found Rehfeld staggering out of the doorway of his office shouting: "I'm shot! I'm shot!" Even as he shouted Rehfeld collapsed and fell dying to the floor.

Those who reached him first removed his coat and in so doing pulled the knife from Rehfeld's back. It dropped to the floor at their feet, a fine leather handled hunting knife with a

6x inch blade sharpened to a razor edge. The long knife plunged full length into his back between the shoulders and slightly to the left of the spine, presumably penetrated a large artery just above the heart.

Rehfeld was carried to the office of a physician a few doors away. He died in less than 20 minutes after being stabbed.

Rehfeld did business under the name of the Washington Brokerage company. He was a Syrian of middle age.

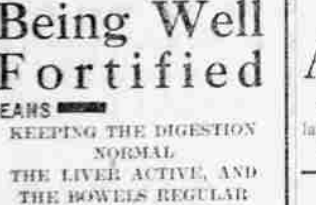
