

SERIOUS RIOTING AGAINST GERMANS IN SOUTH AMERICA

RIO JANEIRO, April 19.—Serious rioting occurred today in Porto Alegre, where manifestations against the German colony have been in progress for several days.

RIO JANEIRO, April 19.—Fire started during the attacks on German property in Porto Alegre, which caused large losses, spread to buildings owned by Brazilians.

An official announcement this afternoon says the situation in Rio Grande Du Sul is now nearly normal.

The German newspapers have suspended publication and the newspapers report that the Germans residing in Parana have withdrawn to Santa Catharina where they are concentrating.
